1955 Timber Sale Plan Work to Start

The office of the Bureau of Land Management has announced that planning work for 1955 timber sales will be starting in the near future. As in the past, priority will be given to salvage of fire-killed, wind-thrown and beetle-infested timber.

In making this announcement, the District Forester has invited interested parties to submit their suggestions of timber to be included in the plan, since one of the considerations in selecting tracts is the interest of prospective purchasers. He has also solicited information about salvage tracts that might logically be considered for sale.

Sixth Annual Sale

This will be the sixth annual timber sale plan prepared by the Bureau in which the location, estimated volume and proposed time of sale will be shown for each tract that is proposed for sale during the coming calendar year. The release of such a plan notifies the prospective purchasers well in advance, so that all who wish to do so may participate in the bidding for the timber.

The plan is prepared initially by the District Forester and his staff, on the basis of the available cut under sustained yield management, the personnel available in the district to cruise the timber, sound forest management practices and interest indicated by prospective purchasers.

Submitted to Board

It is then submitted to the District Advisory Board for its consideration and suggestions. The advisory board is comprised of representatives of the lumber industry, labor, agriculture, livestock, mining, recreation, wildlife and others.

As a general rule, no timber will be offered for sale unless the Bureau can assure equal access for all prospective purchasers. The Bureau also requires that the primary processing of all the timber must be accomplished within the limits of the established marketing area in which it is located, except that salvage timber that does not receive a bid at the advertised sale time may be processed in any O & C marketing area, if purchased under the 90-day provision of the regula-
