The catalogs for the 14th annual Willamette Valley Ram Sale to be held at the Linn County Fair Grounds in Albany on Saturday, August 7, are now available, according to W. B. Parker, County Extension agent.

The catalogs, which can be obtained from O. E. Mikesell, Linn County Extension agent, Albany, list 215 head of stud rams, range rams and ewes in the Romney, Lincoln, Corriedale, Columbia, Hampshire, Shropshire, Southdown, Cheviot, and Suffolk breeds. All animals are yearlings and guaranteed breeders.

Grassman Contest Selection Nears

The fourth annual "Grassman of the Year" contest is moving into its final stages as local agricultural leaders throughout Oregon work toward the selection of their County Grassman for 1954. County winners are to be named by August 15 in order that the candidate's application may be readied for the state contest.

Sponsor of the state and regional "Grassman of the Year" contest is the Agricultural Committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The purpose of the contest is to select and give recognition to the accomplishments of farm and ranch operators who have done outstanding work in grassland development. County contests are sponsored by local organizations in cooperation with the County Extension Agent.

The 1954 "Oregon Grassman of the Year" will be selected from the several county winners. Cash awards of \$300 and \$200 to first and second place state winners are provided by the United States National Bank, Portland. Regional winner is selected from the top grassman from Washington, Oregon and Idaho, and receives a \$1,000 Wade-Rain irrigation system or equipment of similar value, provided by R. M. Wade & Co., Portland.

The 1953 state and regional winners were the Bradetich Brothers of Bend, Oregon.

'Use Codling Moth Cover Spray Soon' Says County Agent

The third cover spray for codling moth control should be applied as soon as possible, according to W. B. Parker, county extension agent.

The recommended sprays are three pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder to 100 gallons of water. Dust of lead arsenate or DDT may be substituted for spray.

Orchardists and entomologists have reported finding an increased buildup of pear psylla and red spider mite. Growers should include malathion or some similar material in the third cover spray to control these pests. Psylla does not attack apples. The use of two pounds of 25 per cent wettable malathion can be used for control of red spider mite.

Legal Opinion Affects Meat Dealer Status

Some Oregon meat dealers will need a different class of license than they now hold as result of a recent opinion the Attorney General's office has given to the state department of agriculture.

Here's the change as result of the opinion: Meat dealers who sell meat in quantity at a price discount based on quantity must now have a wholesale license. This applies whether the sale is to restaurants, hotels, or other meat dealers; under these conditions,

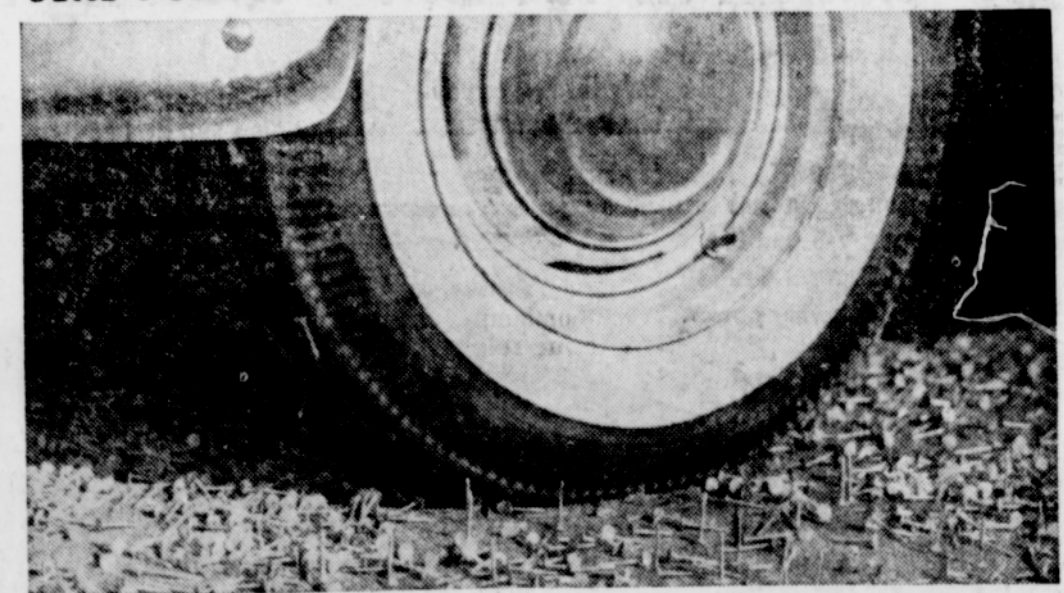
