Grover's Lose Evergreen League Lead As Myrtle Creek Topples Them 14-15

Four runs in the ninth frame, aided by three Grover errors, added up to defeat for Cottage Grove for the first time in six contests as the Myrtle Creek nine squeaked past the Evergreen League leaders 15 to 14 at Kelly field Sunday. A total of 11 errors, as compared to five for Myrtle Creek, tells the major part of the story.

Cottage Grove opened up the game in the first inning when Levings and Wicks gave Grover a 2-0 lead. Myrtle Creek garnered one run in the second and third innings, but CG copped three markers in the third frame to increase the lead to three runs.

CG Lead Cut
Myrtle Creek cut down the lead somewhat in the fifth frame, when two runs were brought in. CG tallied but once in the fourth and was blanked in the fifth.

Four singles and walk and an error netted Grover six markers in the sixth frame for the biggest rally of the day. From here on, however, it was a downhill show for the Grovers. CG netted two more runs in the seventh, and that wound up all scoring for the local nine.

Myrtle Creek garnered three runs in the sixth and, behind five points following CG's sixth inning spurge, then began to cut down the Grover lead.

Creek behind three points. Four markers in the top of the ninth gave the visitors a one run margin which won them the ball game, as CG went down one, two, three at their last time at bat.

Hunting Rules For 1954 to Vary

Final hunting regulations for 1954 varied only slightly from the tentative regulations set earlier in the month by the Oregon State Game Commission.

One of the more important changes was the lengthening of the buck deer season by three days and consequently the moving of the hunter's choice season to the middle of the week.

Generally, the seasons are very similar to the ones that were in effect for 1953; however, there will be no season on the dwindling numbers of sage grouse. This was closed because it is believed that the sage grouse are on the lower part of their cyclic population numbers.

Complete synopses of the hunting regulations will be available from the game commission and its license agencies about Sept. 1. Migratory waterfowl regulations are expected to be announced by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service sometime in August.

Applications Now Available for '54 Antelope Permits

Applications for permits to hunt antelope during the 1954 season are now available at the offices of the game commission and its license agencies throughout the state.

A total of 600 permits are to be issued to resident hunters this year. All applications must be in the Portland office of the game commission before 10 a.m., August 10, and only those on official application forms will be considered.

Parties of not more than four persons may apply together, but \$5 must accompany the application for each person applying. Any one person may apply only in one of the three areas as described in hunting regulations.

A public drawing will be held at the game commission headquarters on August 12, and permits will be mailed to the lucky winners on the 13th.

Seasons in areas one and three run from August 21 to 26, and the open dates in area two extend from August 28 to September 2.

Eight Attractions On Eugene Rodeo Sched. Aug., 13-15

Eight big events have been planned for the Lane County residents in connection with the Emerald Empire Roundup August 13-15 at the Lane County Fairgrounds, Eugene. Police and Jaycees have announced.

The big attractions will be rodeo performances Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m., with tickets now on sale at roundup headquarters in front of the Eugene city hall.

Tickets may also be purchased there for the Buckaroo breakfast, scheduled from 7 to 11 a.m. Saturday, August 14, at the fairgrounds.

The two roundup parades are open to anyone interested. The Junior Buckaroo parade Friday at 2 p.m. will be for youngsters 16 and under. The grand parade will be Saturday at 2 p.m., for individuals, groups, or business firms who wish to enter.

Dances will follow the Friday and Saturday night rodeo performances. They will be in the auditorium building at the fairgrounds, and will begin as the rodeo ends. A western band will furnish music. The public will be welcome.

Portland All-Stars Hoping to Win Annual Shrine Tilt

PORTLAND, (Special)—Can the City All Stars break back into the win column after three straight losses?

That's the \$64 question among football filberts here these days, as time nears for the seventh annual Shriners' hospital all star game, scheduled for August 21 in Multnomah stadium.

City's blue ribbon prep performers haven't edged the State all stars since 1950, and the overall count now stands at 4 wins for State against 2 for City.

Harry Scarff, who has directed Central Catholic to a pair of state crowns, will be at the helm of City for a second straight year, and frankly admits that "on paper, at least" this year's squad looks much stronger than last year.

But Scarff quickly qualifies his statement by pointing out that "State looks stronger, too."

The answer to the big question will start taking shape next week as the opposing all-star squads gather here for two weeks of intensive practice. First workouts are slated for Monday, August 9.

The contest, pitting the state's outstanding high school seniors from 1953 against each other, figures to be a high-scoring affair, as both squads are loaded with swift backs capable of going "all the way."

All proceeds from the contest will go to assist in financing the expansion of Shriners' hospital for crippled children here.

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Ram-Giant Contest To Feature Split-T

PORTLAND, (Special)—"The first professional football team to use the split-T offense will break every scoring and offensive record in the books." That's the prediction of Eddie Erdelatz, coach of Navy.

A good indication of how accurate his prediction will prove will be gleaned here at Multnomah stadium August 8 in the game between the Los Angeles Rams and New York Giants.

This will be the first game in history in which professional teams will operate from the split-T. Both the Rams and Giants have done some experimenting with this offense, which many college teams have found extremely successful, but when they come to grips in Portland it will be the first time either club will give it the full test.

The most important requirement of the split-T is a quarterback who can run as well as pass. Most pro teams have them, but they can't usually afford the luxury of letting the QB run with the ball. He's much too valuable for other missions.

However, both teams are so well supplied at this position this year that they intend to take the risk. The Giants have three former All-Americans who fill the bill in Don Heinrich of Washington, Charlie Conerly of Mississippi and Arnie Galiffa of Army.

The Rams probably won't allow their ace passer, Norm Van Brocklin, to do any running, and when

Draining Under Way At Diamond Lake

P. W. Schneider, state game director, announced today that the drawdown of Diamond lake is under way. Game commission personnel have opened the gates in the drainage canal, and approximately 250 cubic feet per second of water is flowing out the canal.

In a period of slightly over 2 months, 8 feet of water will be taken out of the lake. The area will be reduced from 3,000 acres to 2,400 acres and the volume of the water from 73,000 acre feet to 51,000 acre feet.

Target date for the chemical treatment is September 21. The outlet gates will be closed prior to that date, and the lake will refill to its natural outflow next spring.

Fishing will continue in Diamond lake until September 7. The special bag limit of 30 fish per day and 60 in possession will remain in effect until that time.
