Petty-Cook Clan Picnic Held Aug. 1

Following a bountiful picnic dinner served under the large oaks on the lawn, Mrs. Petty presented a program. A story of the pioneer family of Joseph N. Petty, written by a grandson, Ed Petty of Creswell, was read. This told of the trek westward in the spring of 1853 from Danville, Vermillion Co., Ill., to the Willamette Valley of Oregon and the community now known as Creswell, where a donation claim was taken up. Nancy Prosser Petty, wife of Joseph N. Petty, lost her life in an accident while nearing the end of the long journey and was laid to rest in a lonely grave near the present site of Oakridge. Lucinda Petty of the original family, married Isaac Cook and their descendants are also residents of this area.

Mr. Petty also wrote an article on "A Trip To Eugene In The Early Days" or "A Farmer Goes On Horseback."
