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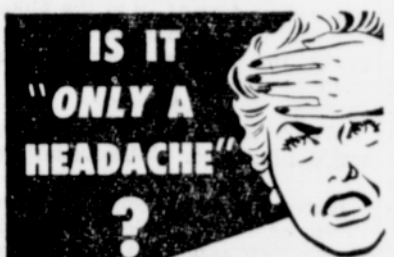
Williams Wins All But Main Event At Deadhead Derby at Olympia Sunday

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Elk Hunt Permits Are Now Available

Applications are now available to hunters interested in hunting in the controlled Tenmile lake hunt from September 18 to 22.

All applications for this hunt must be in the Portland office of the game commission before August 31 at 10 a.m. and must be on official blanks properly filled out, or they will be disqualified.

A total of 100 permits will be issued to hunt the small area in Coos county just east of the town of Lakeside.

Parties of not more than four persons may apply on one application blank, and if their number is drawn, all will receive permits. Persons applying as a part of a party cannot apply again individually.

This controlled hunt is being held to help alleviate damage being experienced by the dairy farmers of the area because of concentrations of elk.

Aerial Plantings For Fish to Begin

July 27 marked the beginning of the 1954 trout lift in the state of Oregon.

About 275 lakes, extending from north of Mount Hood to the Klamath lake area, will be stocked as part of the operation. These isolated lakes range in size from one to five hundred acres and are not accessible directly by roads.

Approximately 500,000 rainbow fingerling and fry sized trout and 600,000 eastern brook will become airborne voyagers.

These fish are dropped from an altitude of two to three hundred feet, and it has been found that the mortality on this type of fish liberation is very low.

Sam Whitney of Newberg will pilot the specially equipped Piper cub aircraft that will deliver the fish. As many as three lakes can be stocked with one plane load of the youngsters, and as high as 35 lakes a day can be reached, providing the weatherman cooperates by supplying good flying weather.

In charge of the aerial fish stocking is Bob Borovicka, aquatic biologist from Bend, Oregon, who will be assisted by other agents from both sides of the Cascades.

Approximately two weeks will be required to complete this year's stocking.

Only Commission Offices to Issue Archery Permits

Archery hunters of the state will have to obtain their free permits at one of the game commission offices this year instead of at the widely scattered distributors of last year.

The problem of distributing permits to all of the license agencies of the state is great since more than 25,000 must be printed to insure equal allotments. This means that in order for less than 5,000 archers to receive permits, five times that many must be sent out. Since these are free permits, there is no source of income to defray the expense of such a large operation.

Permits will be issued at the offices of the commission at Portland, Roseburg, Bend, La Grande, Hines and the E. E. Wilson area near Corvallis. Also permits will be supplied by mail from these offices, providing the archer sends in his name and address when applying.

All archers are required by law to have one of the permits in possession when hunting in an archery area and to send in the attached report card at the end of the year.

Bicycle, Auto Accident Hospitalizes Youth Tues.

A seven year old boy, Reginald Gates, 39 North M Street, was taken to the Cottage Grove hospital Tuesday as a result of an accident in which his bicycle struck the parked car of Clifford A. Neville.

Fish Hatcheries To Be Improved

Four of Oregon's trout hatcheries are getting a "working over."

This is the word from George Kernan, chief engineer for the Oregon State Game Commission.

Most extensive work is to be done at the Hood River hatchery near Dee, Oregon. Donald W. Thompson of North Bend submitted the low bid for work on this station. The project will involve construction of a new hatchery building to replace the one partially destroyed by fire earlier this year plus facilities for the storing and processing of fish food.

At Cedar Creek hatchery near Hebo, Larson Construction Company of Astoria has been working since June 21. Two new ponds are being constructed to replace old dirt bottomed ones. In addition to the ponds, a new dam and wa-

ter intake structure and water supply pipeline are underway. These are being built to replace ones that have deteriorated through age.

P. W. Hamer and associates of Roseburg, won the job of making improvements at the Rock Creek hatchery on the North Umpqua river. Their work, which will start at a later date when the water is lower, will consist of building a new entrance road to replace the one washed out this spring plus construction of a new fish ladder over the hatchery intake dam.

Since July 6, the Bechtel Brothers of Elgin under sub-contract from United-Pacific Construction Company, have been working on improvements at the Wallawa hatchery in northeastern Oregon. Their job consists of building a new dam and water intake pipeline and rebuilding some of the present ponds to facilitate holding of yearling fish.

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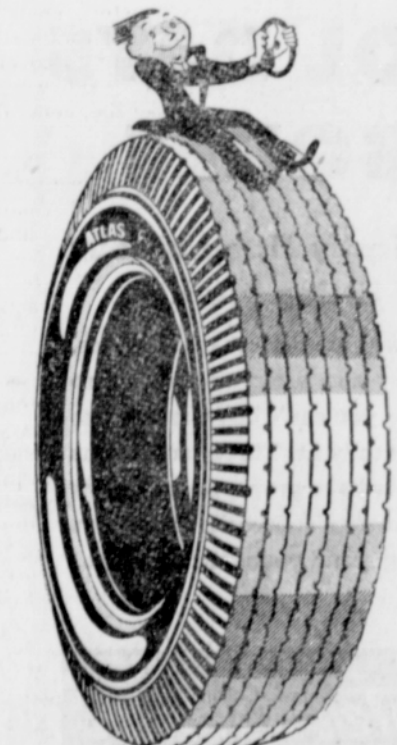
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
