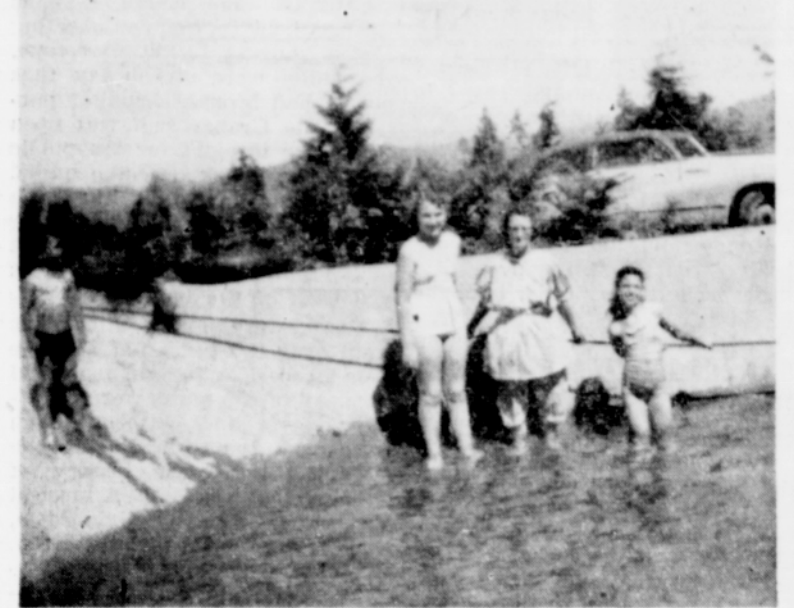

8 States Using Point System, License Revoking

Connecticut was the first state to employ the traffic point system, suggested by Secretary of State, Earl T. Newbry of Oregon this week, as one means of weeding out the habitual traffic violators. The system was inaugurated by Elmer S. Watson, now Commissioner of Motor Vehicles in that state seven years ago, according to the Oregon State Motor Association.

The point system provides that the motorist be given so many points (or demerits) for each traffic violation and that his driver's license be suspended or revoked when and if he reaches a specified number of points. In most states, the motor club points out, a fair hearing is given before such action is taken.

The system is used in eight states, including the District of Columbia, and is providing a valuable aid to identify and eliminate the "repeaters" among traffic violators. It was the Connecticut system that revealed conclusively that between 80 and 95 per cent of the accidents were being caused by from 15 to 20 per cent of the drivers, a fact that carefully kept records by the Oregon Traffic Safety Division bear out.

In Connecticut, good behavior over a period of five years gives the driver a chance to clean the slate. Points are automatically erased when they become five years old. This enables the drivers who want to improve to put their past driving record behind them, the motor club reports.

While the point system is still in its infancy as a traffic enforcement technique, it has much to commend it, the motor club said.

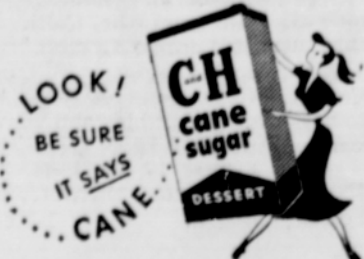
Stork Shower Fetes Mrs. Milton Levings

Europe to Receive Crop Surplus Food

Immediate shipments of two million pounds of surplus food are being prepared by the Christian Rural Overseas Program for its world-wide relief operation under new agricultural legislation passed in Washington June 30.

The CROP surplus shipment will go to Europe and Asia dairy products to refugees and earthquake victims in Europe and cotton seed oil to supply much needed fats to uprooted people in Korea and displaced Arabs in Palestine.

The bill which passed both houses of Congress June 30 is the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954. It provides for the handing over by the government to voluntary agencies operating international relief programs of food supplies which are in excess of domestic requirements.

Immediately on passage of the bill, CROP applied to the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the release of 780,000 pounds butter, 526,000 pounds cheese, 538,000 pounds powdered milk and 180,000 pounds cotton seed oil. The commodities will start on their way shortly after the President's signing of the act to make it into law.

The Christian Rural Overseas Program is the food collection arm of Church World Service, National Council of Churches relief agency. CROP solicits and collects nationwide donations of farm products for feeding hungry refugees and victims of war and disaster abroad. Church World Service delivers and distributes these contributions in areas of need.

Within the last 12 months, CWS shipped and distributed 28,000,000 pounds of food gifts, including CROP contributions and government surplus. Distribution is undertaken either by CWS representatives on the spot or local church and relief organizations.
