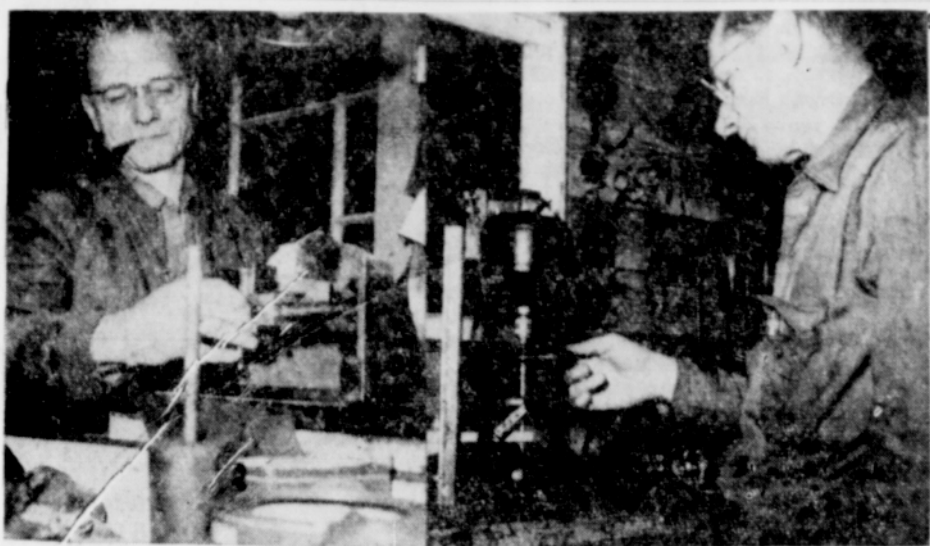

Mrs. Lemert, a collector of antiques, admires the planter lamp her husband made from a piece of fir root driftwood. A copper planter was built in base of lamp. By drilling at an angle from top and bottom of lamp Lemert bored hole for electrical connection.

When the Lemerts return from a trip their trailer is bulging with driftwood and rocks. And Lemert can't wait to get busy in his shop. Left, he places large rock in a vise he "made from junk" as he eagerly anticipates slicing it with diamond saw. Lemert also made diamond saw which is unique in having an oscillator salvaged from a phonograph. The oscillator makes possible cutting big rocks faster and with less pressure. Right, easy does it again with a drill. Its beginning was motor from an old fan. A paper clip holds polished agate in place while fan oscillator moves table up and down for grindings from brass drill. Grindings at intervals reduces heat and results in less danger from cleavage.

(Continued from Page 1—Sec. 1) mand for giving new lease to balking electric motors, washing machines, outboard motors . . . He even repaired a transit for a doubting engineer.

Lemert is also fond of working out other peoples' brainstorms for inventions from their sketched designs. In Oklahoma, he recalls he did considerable patent development. Lemert also has chalked up several inventions of his own. One was a "profile grinder" which made possible mass production of jewelry from semi-precious stones. By a mere adjustment, 4-inch sticks of stone could be ground in square, rectangular, oval shapes. Then from the sticks settings were sawed to desired thickness.

Carbide Yard Light, Fir Root Lamp

Many samples of Lemert's ingenuity may be found at his home. A carbide truck light illuminates his yard. In the Lemerts' dining room a beautiful planter was devised from two 4-foot hog troughs. Covered with masonite they are an attractive container for tuberous begonias. In the living room are three lamps which would make any lamp designer proud. A piece of redwood drift forms one, a fir root forms another. Both of these lamps gleam from hours of hand rubbing with oil and wax. A third lamp is made of aluminum bar ends salvaged from an airplane factory. Its base is black plastic.

Lemert and his wife, a librarian in the Cottage Grove schools, share the interest of collecting antiques. Mrs. Lemert is partial to furniture. Her husband collects old time music-makers. Included in his collection are an old roller organ with reeds like a music box and 115 rolls of music, a cylinder Edison phonograph, and a music box with great metal discs "records" . . . any one approaching a hundred years. Center of attention in their living room is the 20th century marvel—television.
