Rams, Cardinals To Battle Sept. 4 On Portland Turf

PORTLAND, (Special) — Professional football's most furious feud will be settled here at Multnomah stadium September 4 when the Los Angeles Rams meet the Chicago Cardinals.

This is the game that matches Coaches Joe Stydahar of the Rams and Hampton Pool of the Cardinals. The "Arkansas Traveler" was second in the nation last year in total offense. He has the poise of a veteran and, together with Billy Wade of the Rams, is rated one of the brightest rookies in the league.

Jim Root, playing his second season, has developed rapidly and will probably get the starting QB assignment. He was instrumental in leading the Cards to a 27 to 10 victory over the Green Bay Packers in their first game of the season.

Trippi Still in Lineup
Despite the presence of six rookie halfbacks who can run 100 yards in ten seconds, "old pro" Charley Trippi will be back at his familiar left halfback position. In two previous appearances in Portland he has been one of the outstanding players in the field. Trippi can damage the opposition with his punting, punt returns, running, passing and pass catching, a good parlay in any league.

Johnny Olszewski, one of the best rookies in the league last year, will operate at right halfback for the Cardinals. Last year he carried the ball 106 times for 386 yards and four touchdowns and was a key blocker as well.

Cards Protect Passer
Coach Joe Stydahar, commenting on his team's win over the Packers, said the Cardinals showed their best protection for the passer in years and indicated the Cards will rely heavily on their aerial game against the Rams.

Although both teams bring outstanding records into the Portland fray, it figures to be a spectacular ball game without them. This is the grudge battle between Stydahar and Hampton Pool—formerly coach and assistant, now bitter enemies—and if it's only as thrilling as their initial meeting here last year, the fans will love it.

This is also the "rubber" game in Portland between the clubs, with the Rams 24 to 14 winners in 1952 and the Cardinal 23 to 10 victors last year.

With Myrtle Creek and Sutherlin having three losses each and Cottage Grove with only two losses, the latter is now in first place. If Cottage Grove defeats Glide this week (the time of play is not yet known), they will win the top team trophy.

There will be another trophy awarded to the team winning the championship playoffs, which is composed of the top four teams. The playoffs will begin Sunday with Cottage Grove hosting Myrtle Creek and Sutherlin playing Glide at Sutherlin. The winners and losers will play each other the following Sunday to determine the champions.

Open Tag Drawing Will Select 600 Antelope Hunters

A public drawing to select 600 fortunate antelope hunters was held at the Oregon State Game Commission office in Portland on August 12. Immediately after the drawing tags were mailed to the luck applicants.

Several would-be hunters were present to view the drawing which was accomplished as usual by use of IBM machines. The mechanical drawing takes only a short period of time and is absolutely foolproof. Three of those who showed up to watch the drawing drew tags.

First name drawn for Area I was A. W. Grant of Madras; for Area II, it was D. Walker of Gold Hill; and for Area III the first name registered was W. W. Wells of Meacham.

Two hundred tags were issued for each of the areas. Those who were fortunate enough to obtain tags last year were not eligible to participate again this year. A total of 3,032 applications were received this year.

Antelope hunting commences on August 21 in Area I and III and on August 28 in Area II. The season will be six days long in each area.

Archery Permits Not Obtainable At Usual Outlets

Hunters who plan on stalking big game with bow and arrow this fall are reminded that this year archery permits are available only at the game commission headquarters in Portland or at the five regional offices. They are not available at the usual license outlets.

Regional offices are located at Route 1, Box 325, Corvallis; Box 977, Roseburg; 222 East 3rd, Bend; Box 8, Hines; and Box 742, La Grande. The Portland address is Box 4136, Portland 8.

Requests for permits can be made through the mail, and permits are issued free. The only information necessary is the name and address of the applicant.

Plans Follow Concert

Plans to launch a new community orchestra followed a concert which was presented at Eugene High School Auditorium last February to determine what sort of support such an organization could expect from the area.

Pallett said the initial concert "demonstrated beyond all possible doubt that such an orchestra would be appreciated and supported in this area."

Local Musicians in Orchestra

He said the orchestra is composed of musicians from the U. of O. School of Music and residents of Eugene, Springfield, Cottage Grove, Junction City, Corvallis and Lebanon. The conductor, Dr. Cykler, is professor of music at the University.

Charles Steele, Cottage Grove teacher, is in the orchestra's percussion section.

The board of directors of the new association is composed of Bennett Stephenson, chairman; Mrs. Alton F. Baker, Godfrey Blohm, J. O. Julson, Dr. Theodore Kratt, Dr. Keith McMillan and Dr. Pierre Van Rysselberghe. Treasurer is Mrs. Charles G. Briggs.

The concerts will be given at the new Eugene High School auditorium and are planned for October 25, November 22, January 24, February 21 and April 4. (All concerts are Monday nights.)
