More Than 400,000 Books Used Last Year by Students

EUGENE — Students on the eight state system of higher education took home 400,729 books during the last academic year, William H. Carlson, director of libraries for the system, reports.

In addition, 194,190 reserve books, whose use is controlled within a limited time period, were checked out for study in the library.

Director Carlson points out that these figures are only one index of the use of the libraries, some of which are organized so that students can consult the books they need from open stacks. The libraries also maintain considerable collections of non-book items, such as maps, photographs and prints, sound recordings, slides and film strips, and motion films.

Librarians at the institutions answered 36,953 questions during the year, some of them involving considerable research.

All OSC Teaching Graduates Placed For Coming Year

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—All of the available June graduates from Oregon State college who completed work for high school and elementary school teaching certificates have been placed for the coming year.

A report compiled by Miss May Workinger, college placement secretary since 1920, shows an increasing demand for well-qualified teachers. OSC had dozens of requests for teachers this year it could not fill.

Approximately 125 June graduates were placed along with eight summer session students who registered with the placement office.

Calls for women teachers and elementary teachers were especially heavy, Miss Workinger said. Demand far exceeded the supply in home economics, business and secretarial science and women's physical education.

For men, greatest calls come in industrial arts, agriculture, mathematics and physical sciences. Some graduates were placed in college teaching assignments this year and several went to other states. One graduate signed to teach in Hawaii. Salaries for beginning teachers are described as "good" to "excellent."

Miss Workinger also reported that all returning veterans who entered the service two years ago after graduation are being placed as they are released.

Her office maintains records on some 4,500 OSC graduates who are teachers and helps experienced teachers find better positions in addition to placing new graduates.
