National Business Women's Week To Be Observed October 10 to 16

National Business Women's Week is being observed by the Cottage Grove Business and Professional Women's club this year from October 10 to 16. This is the 27th anniversary of the week established in 1926 by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Club, Inc. to call attention to women's social and economic contribution to the United States.

Since then, women have risen to high political and economic places, and National Business Women's Week has grown to be an event of nationwide importance. "Adventures in Achievement" is the theme of the current program which is emphasized during Business Women's Week.

From Marguerite Rawalt, the Federation's president and a Washington attorney, comes seven points, which all women may use as a goal: Patriotic service, positive Americanism, daily prayer, radiating happiness, being good citizens, fine on-the-job work and helping to create new jobs. This is a program for every woman, a chart to guide us.

A message from President Eisenhower to the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs stated: "It is gratifying to learn that during 1954, observance of National Business Women's Week, the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs will

continue to work toward the nationally significant goal expressed in the theme "Get Out the Vote." Your organization has my wishes for another year of success in your public spirited program."

Representatives League Women Voters Explain Nov. Ballot Measures to BPW

Councilwoman Candidate Speaks on Local Tax Base Measure; Rummage, Food Sale in November

The eight measures on the November ballot form were presented to Business and Professional Women's club at its meeting Monday night, October 4, by two representatives of the League of Women Voters from Eugene. The meeting, attended by over 30 women, was held at the home of Mrs. Arthur V. Hile.

Mrs. W. F. Maddron of the league's speaking bureau, and Mrs. Charles E. Ford, president, presented the legislation issues and also passed out the league's non-partisan voters information sheet. They also announced the meet your candidates fair sponsored by the league in Eugene October 22.

Mrs. Maddron pointed out the change in the ballot form. Where formerly a different number appeared before the no and yes on the same measure, this year there will be just one number for a measure.

1952 Outgrowths
She also pointed out that five of the eight measures were similar bills as presented on the 1952 ballot, or were outgrowths of that election. These are the milk control act, daylight saving time, the six per cent tax limitation, sub-districting of representation to the legislature and the domiciliary hospital. New measures are the restriction measure on fishing in certain coastal streams, raise in legislators' salaries and the increase in the number of signatures required to put a measure on the ballot by initiative petition to amend the constitution.

She explained that the measure concerning the six mill limitation on property taxes merely would change the measure approved by voters in 1952 from a statute to a constitutional amendment. She said certain groups felt this would be a further safeguard in case property were to be taxed to raise more revenue for the state, but that others felt it would limit too much the power of the legislature to seek means of revenue.

Regarding the raise in legislators' salaries, Mrs. Maddron said that some people thought it too difficult to get good men to run for office if the salaries were too low, but others felt that it should be a matter of service rather than money.

Reapportionment
In regard to the sub-districting of counties for representation, she pointed out that in 1952 the people voted reapportionment on a population basis, and now the sub-districting would break up larger counties, such as Multnomah, Marion and Lane, and voters would elect representatives in smaller districts. She said this probably would be a big advantage in Multnomah County, where 32 names were on the ballot and the people had to choose 16. She said opponents indicated that they wanted to vote on all the candidates in a county that would represent them.

Proponents of the measure to increase the number of signatures needed to put a measure on the ballot to amend the constitution believe, she added, that it should be harder to amend the document, but others believe it should be left alone until the whole constitution is revised, a plan which is in the offing.

Milk control came up next, with the battle set between those who believe in a controlled economy and those who believe in a free one. Mrs. Maddron pointed out

Mrs. Ford went into detail on this measure, explaining she was a proponent of the appeal of the state milk control act, that in a free market, the prices were proven to be higher. However, she met opposition in Mrs. L. F. Hartwig, of the Grove Maid Dairy, who said that she believed distributors were more willing to take a smaller margin than take the chance of a free market without any controls.

Hospital Measure
On the domiciliary hospital, Mrs. Maddron pointed out that the people voted for this in 1952, but the legislature decided that the bigger need was a hospital for all age mental patients and not just the aged, so the measure is being voted on again in a different form.

The fight on the "fish" bill, she said, was between sports fishermen and commercial fishing interests, that the bill would close seven coastal streams to commercial fishing in the interest of conservation. Oddly, she said, commercial fishermen accuse sportsmen of depleting the streams.

Daylight saving time will be another issue, she pointed out, although the people voted two years ago for standard time. This issue was between the rural dwellers, who are opposed to fast time, and the city people, many of whom are back of it.

Tax Base Measure
Mrs. Tom Gallo, candidate for councilwoman in Ward 3, spoke on the tax base measure to be on the local ballot, pointing out that proponents of the measure believe it would save the taxpayers' money by eliminating special elections on the budget and also enable the city to plan a more flexible program, while opponents believe that they would like to vote on the budget and that this should not be taken out of the hands of the voters. The speaker pointed out that in 1952 the people voted permissive legislation to enable any tax district to change its base in a special election, and that the people here voted the measure down in the May primary, mostly due to lack of understanding. Mrs. Gallo also pointed out that the council and budget committee were not asking for an open hand in financial affairs, that a group that large had always been conservative in their requests for funds, but that the measure, if passed, would allow for some expansion of operations and at the same time save the people money on budget elections.

In other business Monday evening, the club adopted its new budget and voted to send its quota of approximately \$100 to national headquarters to go towards the fund for building a new building.

The club voted to conduct a rummage and cooked food sale early in November.

Chairman of the meeting was Mrs. Raymond Wilder, legislation committee head.
