Webfoots All Set for NCAA-TV In Televised Game of the Week

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Coach Len Casanova's Oregon Ducks will make their second appearance on a national television hookup next Saturday when they meet the Trojans of USC at Portland's Multnomah Stadium.

This contest is the "Game of the Week" as selected by the NCAA-TV committee from among

the weekend gridiron offerings of the nation's colleges. Oregon is the only Northern Division team which has been honored by the video feature bid and is the only team in the conference which will have been picked twice.

Ducks in "Game of Week"

Last year, the Ducks were spotlighted by the "Game of the Week" in their season opener against Nebraska at Lincoln. The Webfoots won that one, 20-12.

Most pigskin experts, remembering Oregon's startling upset of Southern Cal last season, have hailed the NCAA-TV choice this year as "sound" programming. The Ducks have every incentive to repeat their 13-7 triumph of last year, and USC needs a win to further their ambitions for a trip to Pasadena on New Year's Day.

Trojans Preferred

Coach Jess Hill's Trojans will rate a definite edge over the Ducks due wins over Washington State, Pittsburgh, and Northwestern so far this season. Their only loss was to a powerful Texas Christian eleven last weekend.

Meanwhile, the Ducks won the season starter against Idaho, then lost in successive starts against Stanford and the University of Utah. They climbed back into the win column last Saturday with a 35-27 upset over a 13-point favorite, the University of California at Berkeley.

Originally scheduled as a night game, the USC-Oregon tilt has been moved up to the regular, 1:30 p.m. starting time to accommodate the television cameras.

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Bulldogs Bop Lions 27-7 on Currin Field; Grovers Score in Final Frame

The Lions held the North Bend Bulldogs to a 27-7 final score on Currin Field Friday night.

Twenty of the Bulldogs' points were tallied in the first quarter. The Lions went scoreless until the fourth quarter.

Early in the first quarter, the Bulldogs punted to the Lions who fumbled the ball on their 22-yard line. North Bend recovered. Averaging over seven yards per carry, Will Reeve smashed over for the first North Bend TD.

Bulldogs Score Again

Unable to make a first down, CG booted to North Bend, who took over on their 35. On the first play, Bill Ruch danced through the Cottage Grove line 65 yards for a TD. LeRoy King kicked the extra point.

The Bulldogs scored again just before the first quarter gun sounded. North Bend's Ed Lopez intercepted a pass on the Lion 47 and in two plays, the pigskin was at Grove's 11. Will Reeve hit the line three times, bringing the score to a 20-0 shutout.

Dean Castle made it a scoreless second quarter when he intercepted a Bulldog pass when the Bulldogs were only 20 yards from scoring.

North Bend Scoring Ends

In the third quarter, Reeve ripped down the field from his 32 to the Lion 40. King passed to Van Leaven, who reached the 13. Two plays later Reeve and Ruch had the pigskin to the 4. Ruch cracked over for the remaining distance. King converted to end the visitor scoring for the night.

At the beginning of the fourth period, North Bend had the ball on their 40. They gradually worked the ball up to the Cottage Grove 30, where the Lions took it over on a last down.

Castle went to the 35, then Stewart, aided by excellent team work, tore 70 yards into pay dirt. Castle ran for the conversion.

Cottage Grove threatened again when late in the period the Lions worked the ball to the Bulldog 18 but lost the pigskin on downs.

"Have You Seen a Bold, Dynamic Program?"

Does Ike really want Guy Cordon?

NOTE — The editorial reprinted below is from the October 3 issue of Medford's daily newspaper, the Mail Tribune. It was signed with the initials of the paper's Republican editor and publisher, Robert W. Ruhl, Oregon's only Pulitzer Prize winning newspaper editor.

In Ontario, Oregon, Senator Cordon recently declared this election a crucial one, and added: "You have a choice between two totally different philosophies of government."

Absolutely true!

What is Cordon's philosophy of government? The only way one can judge is to check his voting record.

Regarding McCarthy and "McCarthyism," Cordon never voted or spoke against either—he refuses to take a stand today—in fact nine times out of ten in the Senate he followed the McCarthy line. He refused to criticize the junior senator from Wisconsin or his methods at any time. He refuses now. That disposes of that item of his philosophy of government.

One of the vital national issues has been, and still is, President Eisenhower's foreign policy.

There was the Bricker amendment, for example, which was an attempt by the isolationists in the Senate to impair the constitutional right of the President to freely make treaties and international agreements. Even Oregon's Bar Association by overwhelming majority, opposed this attempt to tie the chief executive's hands.

Mr. Eisenhower went all out to bring about the defeat of this effort.

Did Senator Cordon support him?

No, Oregon's senior senator supported Bricker and his Chicago isolationists 100 percent.

When General Eisenhower was head of the North Atlantic Treaty alliance he urged the U. S. Senate to ratify the NATO treaty. Senator Cordon was one of only 13 senators, who voted against "Ike" and his effort to arm western Europe to resist Russian aggression.

The President sought increased funds for soil conservation. Oregon's senior senator voted against his own party and its leader again.

Then there is the issue of reciprocal trade which President Eisenhower has favored so strongly. Again and again, Senator Cordon worked and voted against it!

Also the Taft education bill and amending the Taft-Hartley measure. As usual Eisenhower was on one side, Cordon on the other.

The President wanted a liberalization of the immigration code. Cordon joined the McCarthys and the McCarrans, fighting to defeat it—and to date succeeding.

So one might go on—and on—and on.

On no important issue, except for tidelands oil and public power, has the Eisenhower philosophy of government been that of our senior senator (except, of course that both want Cordon's reelection—which neither could very well oppose).

One really wonders why Ike wants Guy to come back? Perhaps secretly he doesn't.

So as Senator Cordon remarked:

"The voters have a choice this year between two totally different philosophies of government."

It is hard to believe those who are SINCERE in their support of the Eisenhower policies, will vote for a man who opposes them.
