Mr. and Mrs. Earl Davenport and children of Drain were callers at the George McMurrick home

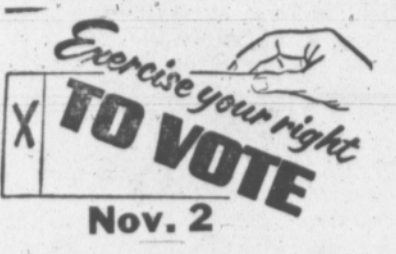
on Tuesday evening of last week.
