License Suspended Only if Reckless Charge Is Provable

The state's driver license suspension program aimed at drivers involved in serious personal injury or fatal accidents affects only those cases in which "there is clear-cut information of incompetent, reckless or unlawful operation."

This explanation was made today by Secretary of State Earl T. Newby who said many people apparently have "the erroneous idea that every driver involved in a serious highway crash will be suspended."

Newby said such wide-scale action would be impossible because of inconclusive information in many cases.

Drivers who could expect suspension if involved in similar crashes now that the new program is in effect are:

The driver who last October passed with insufficient clearance on a curve and killed one person; the driver who was operating on the wrong side of the road because of inattention and killed two people; and the driver who combined excessive speed and driving on the wrong side of the road one November night to kill three people and seriously injure four others.

Most suspensions, Newby said, involve drivers convicted in court of serious traffic violations and others with records of repeated accidents and convictions for various traffic offense.

Grove Receives Large Share Lane Expenditures

The Cottage Grove area has received a substantial portion of the road and bridge expenditures in the last few years, according to a release from the board of county commissioners.

For the fiscal year 1953-54 alone a total of \$482,356.00 was spent on roads in the Grove area, the release stated. Of this amount, over \$364,000.00 was on major betterment of the roads. This is 28% of the total expenditures for the entire county, according to the release.

Mosquitoes Decrease

The decrease in mosquito population, incidentally, was due to the efforts of the board of county commissioners. Money allotted them for betterment of roads in Lane County was used for control of the pests.

Among the roads that have been improved were the Row River road, the Cottage Grove-Lorane road, the London road, the Mosby Creek road and the Gowdyville road.

Silk Creek Bridge

Just recently the Silk Creek bridge was completed. The Row River bridge that was recently broken down on account of overloads is being replaced with a concrete bridge at an estimated cost in excess of \$29,000.00. The county commissioners have given this section of the county a great deal of attention because it was felt they had not received their full share in the past.

The completion of the Cottage Grove-Lorane road is on work order at a cost of some \$81,000.00 which will make it possible for the people of Cottage Grove to drive from Cottage Grove to Lorane, Gillespie corners and Eugene over a new road.

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Research Worker Awarded Project

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—A Faculty Research Fellowship for the study of the political system of the local community has been awarded a University of Oregon political scientist by the Social Science Research Council.

Dr. Vincent Ostrom, associate professor here, who has received the award, is one of the six young educators in the nation selected to do research in specific fields. The three-year fellowship allows him to devote one-half of his time during the school year and his full time during the summer months to the project. His work will include the development and use of general research design for an analysis of policy formation in such a study.

The Oregon political scientist has already done some work in this field as a member of a research team working here under a W. K. Kellogg grant. He will continue this work under the new grant.

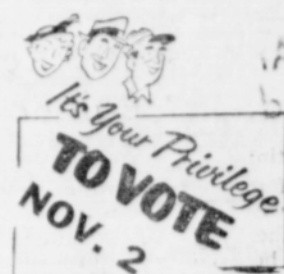
