Oregon Ag Census To Be Up To Date

Reports made by Oregon farmers in the 1954 Census of Agriculture to be taken this fall will bring up to date the statistics now covering a century for the State's farms, according to Field Supervisor Don C. Mote.

The 1954 census will yield information on number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock, selected facilities and equipment (television, food freezer, piped running water, tractors, trucks, etc.), selected expenditures, and other detail.

In England children start when they are five. The children are not placed according to grades but are in Primary Schools. When 10 years old they are given an examination, and placed either in Grammar School or a Trade School.

Miss Ratcliffe has spent four months in Canada and the United States. She sails from New York on November 4.

Veterans Day To Be Observed Nov. 11 This Year

A statewide committee has been appointed by Governor Paul L. Patterson to head the first annual observance of Veterans day, which congress has designated to replace Armistice Day. The day will be observed on November 11, same as before, and will continue to be a legal holiday.

Congress' purpose in changing the name was to pay tribute to veterans of all wars, both living and dead, while Armistice Day was devoted primarily to commemorating the end of World War I.

In appointing his committee, Governor Patterson called upon citizens of all Oregon communities along with veterans to participate in recognition of the contribution that our veterans have made to the cause of world peace.

Chairman of the Veterans Day committee will be H. C. Saalfeld, director of the state Department of Veterans' Affairs. Serving as co-chairmen will be the state commanders of five veterans' organizations, as follows:

Carl Moser, Portland, American Legion; Ronald Dicken, Molalla, Veterans of Foreign Wars; Baden R. Robinson, Grants Pass, Disabled American Veterans; Carl R. Carlson, Portland, Military Order of the Purple Heart; and O. F. Gullickson, Portland, United Spanish War Veterans.

The Governor's action was taken at the request of President Eisenhower's National Veterans Day committee, which urged the co-operation of all state governors "in assuring that this significant holiday will appropriately be observed by every state and community throughout the nation."
