Sweet Home Bumps CG Lions 14-7 in Final Game of Season

Cottage Grove wound up its 1954 football season Friday with a two win-seven loss record as the Sweet Home Huskies downed the Lions 14-7 in a non-league tilt at Sweet Home. It was the only victory for the Huskies all season.

Sweet Home scored early in the first period on a 59-yard drive. Quarterback Gib Walsh shone for the Huskies as he romped for 16 yards and then cracked over the remaining two for the TD. A 17-yard pass from Phil Kikel to Eddie Norquist also highlighted the drive. Kikel's PAT was good.

Late in the second quarter, the Lions started rolling, racked up one score and came within seconds of hitting pay-dirt again.

Taking over on the Huskie 45, Cottage Grove picked up its first down of the contest, and scored in three plays. Leon Hayes flipped a pass to Jay Wilson for 20 yards. Dean Crammer sprinted for another 15 and another Hayes to Wilson pass combination was good for Grove's only TD. Childers kicked the PAT to tie up the contest.

The Lions generated another drive in the fleeting seconds of the first half. A 17 yard pass play from Hayes to Doug Ballew was nullified, but CG came back with another pass that clicked this time for 36 yards to the Huskie four. Greg Stewart cracked over from the distance, but time ran out before the play could start.

Sweet Home took the second half kickoff and marched 62 yards in eight plays for the final score. The Huskies' offense was highlighted by a 30 yard run by Walsh and a 12 yard dash by Norquist for the TD. Kikel's PAT was again good.

The remainder of the contest was played in Lion territory as the Groves were unable to pull together a clicking offense.

Wild Rimrock Sheep Again in Oregon; Extinct Species Absent Since 1900

Oregon again has wild rimrock sheep, the first since the early 1900's!

Last of the native rimrock sheep in this state, a subspecies of the rocky mountain bighorn sheep, were exterminated by hunters in about 1916.

However, at 2:20 a.m., Monday, November 8, rimrock sheep were again on Oregon soil, after having completed a 36-hour truck ride from the interior of British Columbia.

Through a cooperative agreement with the British Columbia Game Department and financed with federal aid funds, the Oregon State Game Commission transplanted 20 of the few remaining rimrock sheep to the steep slopes of Hart mountain, in the center of their former range.

Sheep From BC

The sheep were trapped near Williams Lake, British Columbia through the efforts of Lawson Sugden and other personnel of the British Columbia Game Department. Transportation details were worked out well in advance by Dr. James Hatter of that department and Bob Mace, chief big game biologist for the Oregon Game Commission.

When word was received in Oregon on the afternoon of the 5th that the trap had been sprung and the sheep were available, the transplant got under way.

Mace, accompanied by Roy Dickinson and Ron Shay, also of the Oregon Game Commission, were soon on the way to Williams Lake with a one-ton truck equipped to haul sheep.

Twenty sheep were selected from the group in the trap, and the south bound load consisted of

Oregon Tops U.S. In Deer Kill

Oregon led the nation! It led the nation last year in numbers of deer taken by hunters and ranked second only to Montana in total take of big game animals.

Official statistics compiled by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service from all of the states in the union show that Oregon led the list with a kill of 106,000 deer. Michigan ran second with a take of 97,900 deer, and Utah placed third taking 94,000 deer.

Only two states surpassed the one hundred thousand mark in total big game killed. Though

Montana killed fewer deer, the number of other animals taken put the total big game above Oregon's.

Michigan killed the largest number of any one species since all of the deer killed in that state were white-tail deer, while in Oregon the kill consisted of three different deer.

Smallest legal deer kill on any animal was the one white-tail deer taken in Kentucky.

The Fish and Wildlife Service estimates that the total big game kill in the United States during 1953 was 1,342,597 animals leaving 9,334,520 for breeding stock.

No estimates are yet available as to the 1954 kill.

Archers Eag 49 Deer This Season

Final compilation of the deer kill in the McDonald forest archery area has been released by the Oregon Game Commission.

According to records kept by commission personnel and students from the fish and game management department at Oregon State College, 1,031 archers managed to bag 49 deer.

One sample count revealed some interesting information regarding the hunt.

Three hundred sixty archers were questioned and stated they had fired a total of 1,182 shots

at deer. It was not determined how many of the 49 deer were killed by these 360 hunters.

Also, in the final tally, it was found that 360 archers had been able to loose their arrows at deer, but 378 did not get a chance to shoot.

Not all of the hunters checked out of the area after hunting accounting for the discrepancy of figures. The area was opened for hunting for two week ends.
