Lions Lose Third Game by One Point As Spartans Tip CG 52 to 53 Friday

Friday evening the Grover Five lost their third straight basketball game of the season 53-52, to the charging Corvallis Spartans. The game, at Gill Coliseum, was the Lions' third consecutive one point loss.

Corvallis didn't get many shots during the first half but came up with a half-time 22-21 lead. Cottage Grove was a little dazed when the Sparts began the second half with a full court press. Corvallis was quick to notice this and took advantage. They, led by Neil Kinion, quickly acquired an eight point lead.

Gap Widened
The Sparts kept widening the gap between themselves and C.G. until they had a ten point lead. Doug Ballew and Dean Castle sparked a rally in the last five minutes and came within one point of the Spartans. Big Dean could have tied the score on a gift shot, but it turned out to be a blopper.

Corvallis widened the gap to

three points with less than one minute left to go, but Ballew snatched a rebound and plunked it through the hoop as the final horn sounded. This made the final score 53-52 for our third one-point loss.

Ballew Leads Again
Doug Ballew again led in scoring with 16 points, most of which were made in the second half. Rice, mostly on skillful, long, push shots in the first half, made 14.

This game was a preliminary to the close Oregon State - Southern Cal. game. Oregon State lost by only two points.

Grovers Drop Fourth Hoop Contest; Bulldogs Blast Lions 60-52 Sat. Nite

In a fiery game here Saturday evening before an almost full house, the Lions bowed to North Bend 60-52, in a game that broke Grover's three games one-point loss streak.

After playing an even first quarter, Leroy King of North Bend broke the 15-15 deadlock by throwing three fingers during the first two minutes of the second period and the Bulldogs kept pulling away until, with the use of a full court press, they captured a ten point lead at the half. North Bend was sharp on rebounds and held the Lions to only one field goal by Greg Stewart.

Again in the third period, the Bulldogs sped into a fast break attack and boosted their lead considerably 51-35. Their biggest spread was 55-35, but two minutes before the end, the score was 58-42. Then Doug Ballew cut loose to slice the gap in half. His skill at hooping the ball was uncanny during the remaining minutes. It seemed as though he couldn't miss.

During the last two seconds as

the Grovers were on the march for one last score, Ballew let fly about three yards on the North Bend side of the 10 second line, everyone waited tensely as the ball soared up and then slid through the hoop as though carefully aimed as the final horn sounded.

Ballew and Woolstenhulme were high point men with 16 points each. This was the fourth game in which Ballew has been high pointer with 16 points.

Oregon sport fishing regulations will be tentatively set approximately one month from now. After a public hearing at the Portland office of the commission on January 14, the tentative rules will be announced.

Deer Kill for 1954 To Better 1953 Bag

Initial returns of hunter report cards indicate that this year's deer kill will easily equal the one for 1953.

By the end of November of this year, 120,376 hunter report cards had been returned to the Portland office of the game commission. The total reported kill on these cards was 70,088 deer.

Preliminary reports from the auditing division of the game commission also indicate more deer tags were issued for the 1954 season than for the preceding one.

After the deer report cards have been counted, a questionnaire will be sent the hunters selected at random, to check the accuracy of the report cards and also obtain further information regarding the kill by persons not reporting.

Last year, only 60 per cent of the deer hunters returned their report cards. This year's total is not yet known, but as in the past two years, the return of cards from the archers is behind that of the rifle hunters.

The game commission urges all hunters to send in their report cards. The information contained on the cards is important in the management of Oregon's deer herds. Also, a hunter may be refused a license next year if the report is not returned this year.

If the card has been lost, a two cent post card is an acceptable substitute providing it contains the area hunted, county, nearby towns or landmarks, type of deer killed (buck, doe, or fawn), and in the case of a buck, the number of antler points on each side. Also, the hunter should state the number of days hunted and sign and return the card to the Oregon Game Commission, P. O. Box 4136, Portland, Oregon.

Two Bills Highlight Game Commission Legislative Meet

Legislation to be proposed by the Oregon State Game Commission at the forthcoming legislative session is highlighted by two bills, one a loaded gun law and the other providing for the repeal of laws creating big game refuges.

In addition the commission will propose bills designed to tighten up on the issuance of special licenses to disabled veterans, pioneers, and elderly indigents.

Another bill would enable the game commission to obtain needed control over the importation of fish for release in private ponds.

No Loaded Rifles

The loaded gun law would prohibit the carrying of loaded rifles or shotguns in vehicles on right of ways open to the public. A number of serious hunting accidents have resulted from the practice. Laws similar to this are in effect in many states.

The proposed license amendments would provide that disabled veterans be currently rated 25 per cent disabled and residents of the state at the time they entered the service. The issuance of pioneer licenses would be confined to those whose birth date is not later than 1899 with other qualifications remaining the same. This bill would, if adopted, eventually bring about a discontinuance in the issuance of pioneer licenses to new applicants.

People applying for the old age indigent license would be required to provide the game commission with a certificate issued by the State Public Welfare Commission to the effect that they are unable to pay the regular license fee.

The fee for all three of these special licenses would be revised from 50 cents to one dollar to cover increased administrative costs.

By action of the commission, the majority of the big game refuges have been open to hunting for a number of years. The game commission has the authority to make seasonal and area closures when necessary, thus eliminating the need for permanently established refuges.

Altho the game commission can regulate the transfer of fish from one body of water to another in the state, there is no law at present providing for the control of importation of live fish for release in privately owned waters.

The proposed bill would require a permit in advance of such importation. The introduction of unwanted species of fish into public water through escapement from private ponds has been of major concern to the game commission.

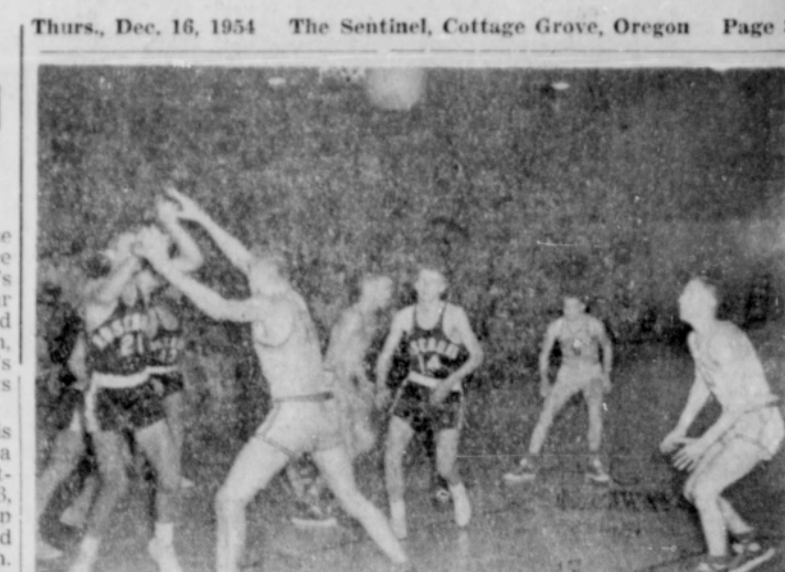

Dredging Has Long Effect on Streams

When dredges move into a stream, desirable fish move out for many months. This fact was firmly established by work carried on by Homer Campbell, game commission fisheries agent, working out of La Grande.

Dredging on the Powder river ceased in early August, and the trout had been forced out of the river for many miles below the dredge operation, it was believed they would return when operations ceased.

According to information compiled by Campbell to date, no rainbow trout have been found in a 50-mile area below the dredge. However, it was found that in a 100-yard test area a short distance below the dredge, there were over 200 squawfish, 50 suckers, 100 shiners, 1 chisel mouth and 1 cottid still surviving nicely. These undesirable species did well in the water kept turbid by dredging operations.
