Missionary From India Speaks to Local Group

O. W. Lange was the speaker of the morning at the Seventh-day Adventist Church January 1. Elder Lange and his wife and two daughters were visiting his sister, Mrs. Holly Foos. Elder Lange told of his work in India where he has been since 1930 and plans to return in the spring.

Elder Lange with his wife and little daughter went out to Bombay in 1930 working for a number of years near the birthplace of Mahatma Gandhi. Later they went into north east India in Assam where they began a new work for the hill tribes on the Himalaya mountains. They were able to rent a tract of land of 400 acres from the government for a period of 30 years. There they gathered native children, keeping them in their own home, a temporary building, for three years while a large school building was being built.

Every board was hand sawed and finished and carried to the site on the backs of men, many of whom were students there. They built it and later homes for faculty, dormitories for homes and a tree.

Today the school has a student body of around 200, some of whom could not speak a word of English. There are five languages among them. Some students still come from the Naga Hills where human sacrifices are still secretly made. These students then go back as teachers to their own people.

Elder Lange after his first term of service went back in charge of the whole area with headquarters in Calcutta while Mrs. Lange was in charge of the Education work. Often she held teachers meetings several days' journey into the hills where teachers walked many miles to come from back country where white people were not allowed. Her institutes were often held under a tree.

Elder Lange told of encounters with wild tigers, leopards and Himalayan bears. One occasion the villagers asked help in killing a huge bear that had killed two natives and mauled six others. So with a borrowed shotgun and the help of the excited village people the bear was cornered and he shot it.

Elder and Mrs. Lange are spending the winter in Walla Walla, Wash., where two of their daughters attend college. In May they plan to sail again to India. Their eldest daughter is now married and with her husband is teaching in the Assam Training school which her father established.

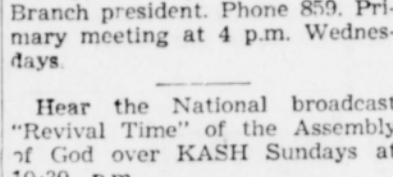
