Government Debt Limit Increased Three Times Between Years 1939 and 1954

The total debt in this country—including amounts owed by government, by corporations, and by individuals—increased more than threefold between 1939 and 1953, according to a study released recently by the Northwest office of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Furthermore, states the NAM, the portion represented by government (federal, state, and local) debt increased from about one-third of the 1939 total to almost half of the much larger 1953 total. It is reasonable to expect that in a growing economy, debt will also increase, says the NAM report. In this period, total debt increased in a ratio of 3.3 to 1, whereas the actual increase in physical production was not quite 2 to 1.

The report says that the rise in the price level has meant that the real burden of the debt has increased as much as the dollar figures would make it appear. Debts can now be paid off in dollars that are worth only 52 cents compared with the 1939 dollar. The other side of the picture, emphasizes the NAM, is that credit-debased dollars. Creditors include savings bank depositors (whose deposits are invested in government and corporate bonds and in mortgages) and insurance policy holders (whose policies are backed by the same forms of debt).

The report concludes with the statement that debt expansion—in excess of the amount called for by normal economic expansion—is the root cause of inflation.

Sawlog, Pulpwood Prices Fluctuate

Oregon State College—very few mills are operating during the holidays, so most prices are quoted on a nominal basis.

SAWLOGS: No. 2 second-growth Douglas fir sawlogs at Willamette Valley were \$35 to \$45 a thousand, mostly \$45. No. 3 sawlogs were \$26 to \$32. Short logs were \$1 to \$2 less. Peeler logs were \$65, \$75 and \$90 a thousand. At Coos Bay, No. 2 "third-growth" logs brought \$33 to \$35 a thousand, No. 3's were \$28 to \$30. Long camp-run logs were \$30 to \$37, mostly \$34. Short logs were \$2 less. No. 1 old-growth sawlogs were \$43 to \$45. No. 2's were \$36 to \$38, and No. 3's were \$26 to \$30. Peeler logs \$60, \$70 and \$80 to \$85 a thousand. Outlying areas paid 2 to \$4 below prices on the Bay.

PULPWOOD: Hemlock, spruce, and Douglas fir were \$17 a cord at Oregon City, and \$15 at St. Helens. Hemlock, spruce, and white fir were \$15 a cord, or \$30, 50 to \$32 a thousand at Coos Bay.

POLES AND PILING: Demand for poles and piling was spotty. Forty to fifty-foot barkie poles found the best market. Forty-five barkies brought 14 to 22 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameters.

HARDWOODS: Alder, ash, maple and cottonwood at Portland were \$36 for 10-inch diameters. Ten-inch alder brought \$34. Williamson, Alder, ash and maple brought \$32 for 12-inch logs at Astoria.

OTHER FOREST PRODUCTS: Dry cascara bark was 15 cents a pound. Swardfern was 14 cents a bunch. At Coos Bay, salal was 25 cents a bunch and huckleberry brush was 23 cents.

Dun & Bradstreet Shows Lane County Business Increase

The growth and development of Lane County was emphasized recently when the physical count of businesses listed in the November, 1954 Reference Book of Dun & Bradstreet was completed. The new count showed 2643 mercantile businesses listed in Lane County according to J. Harry White, Dun & Bradstreet manager in Portland.

The Reference Book lists commercial enterprises—manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, and other businesses, generally those buying on credit. It does not, however, include some service and professional establishments, such as real estate brokers, barber and beauty shops, stock brokers, etc. Thus, figures for all businesses in Lane County would be higher than the ones quoted above. Cities in Lane County listed with large number of businesses were Eugene 1561, Springfield 333, Cottage Grove 191, Junction City 111, Florence 97 and Oakridge 71.

1400 Changes Made

White estimated that during 1954 about 1400 changes were made in the Reference Book listings of Lane County concerns, including new names added, names withdrawn, changes in ownership, changes in credit ratings, and trade styles. The credit listings of Lane County businesses are within the reach of virtually every firm from which these businesses may want to buy merchandise.

Using the Reference Book listings as a guide, it is interesting to note the number of enterprises listed in some of the major cities of Oregon and Southern Washington.

Fir Plywood Tops Four Billion Feet Starting Its 50th Year of Production

Production of Douglas fir plywood in the western states of the United States in 1954 is estimated at 3.85 billion square feet, the highest production total for the industry in its 49-year history. This is reported by The Timberman, leading timber industry journal, published in Portland, in its January, 1955 issue and 24th Annual Plywood Review.

The additional 350 million square feet produced in British Columbia brings the total production of Douglas fir plywood to 4.4 billion square feet. Added to this were 275 million square feet of pine plywood, 26 million square feet of redwood plywood and 87 million square feet of other softwood plywoods bringing the total softwood plywood production for the western part of North America to 4.75 billion feet. The area also produced 127 million square feet of hardwood plywood for a grand total of 4.88 billion feet of plywood in the West.

During 1954 there were 159 separate plywood and veneer operations in the West Coast states, 112 producing plywood and 47 veneer. Eight new plywood plants came into operation during 1954, four in Oregon, three in California and one in British Columbia. Thus, 1955 will see 51 softwood plywood plants in Oregon, 36 in Washington, 17 in California, 10 in British Columbia and 1 each in Idaho, Montana and Alaska. Six new veneer operations were started in 1954, four in California, one in Washington and one in Canada. The timber products trade journal says present indications are that eight new plywood plants will come into operation in 1955.

It was a turbulent year for the industry with a sluggish first quarter and a 3-month strike in the summer. However, at the strike's end, pent-up demand for plywood pushed new order and production to new highs. A conservative estimate puts sales for the year about 2% ahead of 1953. The industry faces 1955 optimistically, in fact, plans to increase sales by 10 million square feet a week. Some of this optimism is based on the fact that 1.2 million housing starts are estimated for 1955 and recent records show plywood is becoming an increasingly popular material in this field. 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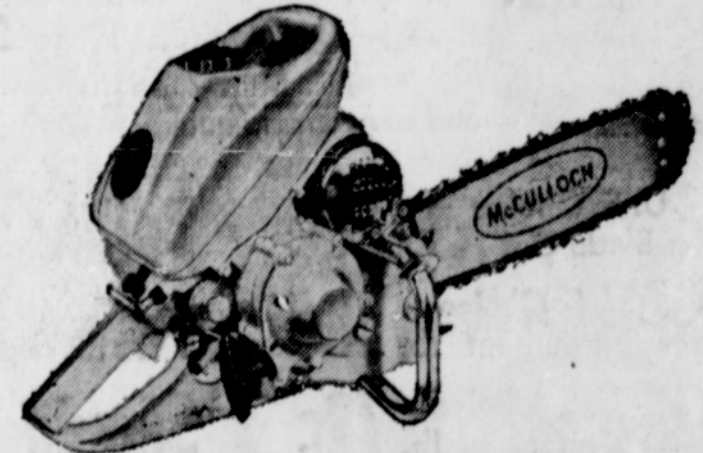
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
