Wallowa Lake New Home for Mackinaw

The clear cold depths of Wallowa lake will eventually be "home" to thousands of Mackinaw lake trout in the egg stage at the Enterprise fish hatchery of the Oregon Game Commission.

A first census of the eastern brook and Dolly Varden trout, the Mackinaw needs deep, cold water, rocky spawning area, and other bottom loving fishes for its survival, growth, and reproduction. Although growth is slow, the Mackinaw is a hardy character and provides real thrills at 5 pounds or over.

Many Clubs
Wallowa lake has been supporting tremendous populations of whitefish, suckers, dace, and cottids, which furnish no direct return to the angler. True, a relatively small number of "big" (over 15 inches) rainbow and Dolly feed on them, particularly the cottid. Stomach sampling of large rainbow trout taken in Wallowa lake indicates that only a fraction of the coarse fish species is being used for food. Since the deep-ranging Mackinaw will be rubbing elbows with bottom type fishes, their food supply will be readily available.

Mackinaw have been stocked in the lake in years past but failed to provide angling for reasons probably associated with the small size at which the fish were planted

(fry). Game commission plans call for holding the fish for a year. "Coexistence" Possible
There is every reason to believe that rainbow and kokanee can be maintained along with Mackinaw. An example of "coexistence" is found in Odell lake. Mackinaw are much in demand by anglers who take them up to 24 pounds in weight (average weight in 1953 was 11 pounds). Along with the large Mackinaw, the kokanee provides excellent fishing in Odell. The average length of kokanee is greater (12 to 16 inches) than in Wallowa lake (9 to 11 inches), an indication of richer water in Odell lake.

Careful handling of the 75,000 eggs from Montana should provide a nucleus of Mackinaw trout stock in about two years' time for distribution in Wallowa lake as 6 or 7-inch fingerlings, able to be on their own.

In the meantime, rainbow trout will continue to be planted, with emphasis on the season-long distribution of legal-sized fish and the increased use of marked rainbow 4 to 6 inches long.
