Social Security Farmer Benefits Reviewed by OSC

Most farmers and farm workers in Oregon are affected by amendments to the federal social security law passed by congress in 1954, reports Manning Becker, farm management specialist at Oregon State college. The law now brings federal old-age and survivors insurance to most farm families.

Beginning this month, persons who farm for themselves will be included in social security if they make as much as \$400 a year profit from their farming operations, the specialist explains. Farm workers are included if they are paid cash wages of \$100 a year or more by any one farmer.

Farm earnings may now count toward social security benefits for both farmers and their families. These benefits are in monthly payments in old age, and monthly payment to survivors in case of the breadwinner's death. A lump-sum payment will also be made at the time of an insured person's death, at any age. This payment may range from \$50 to \$255, says Becker.

Farmers must have worked under social security for at least 1½ years before being entitled to all of its benefits. These benefits are payable to a retired individual at age 65 or his survivors.

The specialist points out that these benefits aren't paid automatically, however. It is necessary to claim them. Information on how to do this is available from local social security offices.

The first thing farm operators and workers should do is get social security cards if they don't already have them, stresses Becker.

Social Security, like income tax, is now compulsory. The farm operator has the dual responsibility of reporting his own earnings at the end of each year at the time he files his income tax return, and the wages he paid his farm employees.

Farmers are to pay three percent social security tax on their net earnings from the farm. However, no tax is paid on earnings of over \$4200 during a year. To simplify reporting, a farmer is allowed to report one-half of his gross income if this isn't over \$1800. If his gross income is over \$1800 during a year, he must report his actual net income. If the net income is less than \$900, he may have the option of reporting \$900.

The farm operator is required to withhold two per cent of each of his employees' pay up to \$4200 annually. He must match this amount and make a report to the director of internal revenue showing the worker's name, social security number, and amount of wages paid him.

Extinguishers Help If Snow, Icy Roads Delay Fire Fighters

Bad driving conditions caused by winter's snow and ice give fire fighters a hard time. The National Board of Fire Underwriters, because the fire department may be delayed in answering the alarm.

It is a good idea, therefore, to keep first-aid fire fighting appliances on hand for use in those first vital minutes before the fire-fighters arrive—minutes in which a small fire can easily get out of control. However, no attempt to fight the fire should be made, children in the family are safely out of the house.

Although there is no all-around extinguisher which can be used on every type of fire, the 2½-gallon soda-acid type or 2½-gallon water pump tank will be suitable for most parts of the home. Exception is the kitchen, where because of the danger of fires involving fats or greases a carbon dioxide or dry chemical extinguisher is preferred.

Whatever type you choose, be sure every extinguisher you buy bears the label of Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. As soon as you buy one, carefully read directions for operating it. Inspect all extinguishers at least once a year. Follow manufacturers' instructions for refilling.

Lloyd Hill Named Cattleman of Year

Lloyd Hill, Harney County commercial cattle raiser, was named Oregon Cattleman of the Year at a special roast beef dinner at the Ochoco Inn in Prineville Tuesday evening, December 28. Hill was awarded the Herman Oliver trophy after receiving the greatest number of points in a special scoring system set up to determine the winner of the contest. The five district contestants were scored on (1) cattle production, (2) forage production, (3) ranch management and (4) public relations. One hundred points were allowed for each topic with a possible maximum score of 400 points.

Ralph Breese, veteran purebred breeder of horned Herefords from Oregonville, Harney County, was winner was close runner up and outscored all the contestants in public relations.

Dick Hibberd, Polled Hereford breeder from Imbler was a high score man in forage production. Gerry Klose, Grants Pass, Chester Chase and Son, Eugene, Breese and Hibberd were awarded special wall plaques by Herman Oliver as district winners for 1954. Also receiving wall plaques as past district winners were O. D. Hotchkiss, Burns; George Webb, Mayville; Walter Fisher, Oregon City; George Russell, Vale; Lauren T. Woodydy, Grants Pass; Henry Gerber, Klamath Falls; and Herbert Chandler of Baker.

Scoring for this year's contest was done by Walter Shrock, Bend and Orville Yancey, Prineville. Public relations: Harry Lindgren retired livestock specialist, Oregon State College scored on cattle production; E. R. Jackman, range crops specialist, Oregon State College on forage production and Manning Becker, farm management specialist from Oregon State College on ranch management.

Rains, Warm Nights End Frog "Slumber"

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Heavy rains and warm nights bring frogs and salamanders out of their Rip Van Winkle sleep in the winter. Dr. Robert Storm, Oregon State college zoology professor, has observed.

Dr. Storm checked some 175 rough-skinned newts, 700 long-toed salamanders, 12 red-legged frogs and 375 Pacific tree frogs in and out of a quiet creek-side pond to learn more about their habits and to find out what wakes them from winter's hibernation.

The reproductive cycle goes on during the hibernation period. Hormones and reproductive tissues have to reach a certain level before the weather acts as a trigger, Dr. Storm said.
