Ill Health Often Due To Fallen Organs

Another term for fallen organs is prolapses. Many people suffer from this condition unknowingly. The organs most commonly prolapsed are the stomach, intestines, and the uterus. Constipation can be due to prolapses of the colon. Prolapses not only produce abnormal function of the organs involved, but also affect the surrounding tissues upon which they rest, by interfering with their normal circulation and function. The most common cause is lack of nerve supply to the affected muscles supporting the organ. Severe injuries and overeating are other causes.



When muscles lack nerve impulses they lose their tone, or in other words, they lack elasticity, thus relaxing and causing the organs to drop. Relaxation of vascular walls as in varicose veins is, some times brought about in the same manner.

Chiropractic adjustments reach the cause of most of these conditions by removing interference with the transmission of nervous impulses, causing the muscles to draw up and return the organs to the normal position.

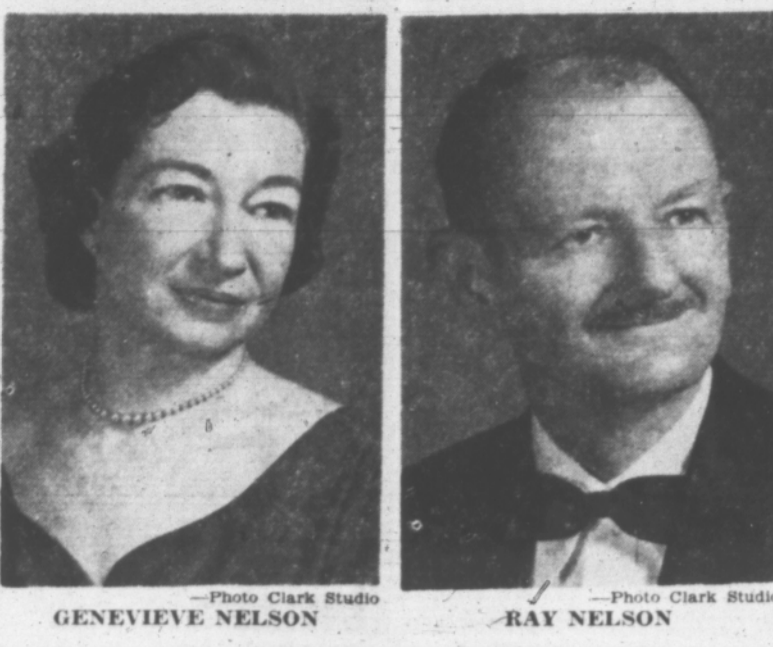

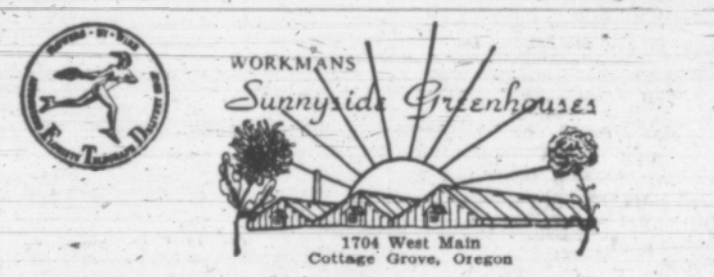

Printing, as an Art

"The Oath of a Free Man" was the first book published in America. John Harvard left a legacy of 300 books and 780 pounds to a struggling college to promote printing of books and found a library. In 1638 a printing press was unloaded at Boston, the 780 pounds was tapped and the Printing Art was established. "Public Occurrences" the first newspaper, printed in Boston, made its appearance in 1689.

This newspaper, the books and magazines on your shelves are descendants of Jesse Glover's first printing press. In spite of radio, television and telephones, communication would be a sorry, ineffectual affair without our printing presses. With swiftly formed lines of type, messy ink rollers and paper being fed faster than one can count, our printing press is the genius of our modern world.
