E. T. Newbry Warns Oregon Motorists Of Winter Hazards

Posted street and highway speeds may be far from safe when roads are packed with snow and covered with ice, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reminded today.

With winter weather bringing slippery going to much of the state, the secretary reminded that Oregon's basic rule, speed law means motorists may be in violation even when traveling at or below the speed designated for a particular area.

Posted speeds are intended to apply under normal road and weather conditions, safety officials pointed out. When conditions are worse than normal, good driving judgment, as well as the law, calls for reduced speed to insure proper car control. Under severe road, weather, or traffic conditions, a rate of travel considerably lower than the posted speed may be needed to comply with the law.

"Oregon's speed statute requires drivers to display common sense in determining a safe speed under any condition encountered," Newbry stressed. "Most drivers have no trouble recognizing obviously dangerous traffic situations and reducing speeds accordingly."

One way to gauge danger on snow or ice is to get the "feel" of the road by trying your brakes at slow speeds in an area free from other traffic, according to safety authorities.

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'54 Census Report Forms Given State Businesses

Report forms of the 1954 Census of Business are being mailed to Oregon retail, wholesale and service businesses, theaters and other amusement places, hotels and tourist courts, early in January by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. The report forms are adapted to the various kinds of business and smaller firms need answer only a minimum of basic inquiries.

Approximately three million business firms throughout the United States will receive the 1954 census forms. Information collected in the census is confidential and will be used by the Bureau of the Census in compiling new statistics on business activities for the Nation, States and smaller areas for the first time since the results of the 1948 Census of Business were published.
