Government Costs Affect Home Owner

It looks to us that the search now being conducted by the state legislature for new sources of revenue is likely to wind up in the lap of the home owners, in the absence of any will or desire to adopt what some twenty-three other states have adopted in the form of some kind of sales tax. All the ways of raising the \$65,000,000 needed to conduct the state affairs, including the Portland State College will further penalize the thrifty and will certainly discourage venture capital, which this state so badly needs.

We have heard it remarked several times recently that in view of the present circumstances, it would not hurt the state any to tighten its financial belt a bit so to speak. We are witnessing a political maneuver by the Portland politicians of trying to place the Portland State College or rather trying to advance the interests of at the expense of the other institutions. It was a political move that created this institution in the first place. Oregon had just about as much use for another college as a hog has for a side saddle. No institution of learning, supported by state funds is big by any standard and the existing institutions, if properly supported could have cared for the needs of the state for years to come. Instead of this, it looks like the legislature is going to fork over funds to care for the Portland institution, regardless of what happens to the other places of learning in the state. In fact it's part of the \$65,000,000 the income tax payers and the property tax payers will be asked to fork over.

At least it seems the state senate looks with favor on the Portland school and recently voted 24 to 2 to make the Portland school an independent college. This institution has already cost the state \$875,000,000 and under a proposal priority would be given to spend an additional \$825,000,000 for classrooms.

How Honest Is Wayne?

From the time Wayne Morse entered politics on the war labor board until now, he has never ceased to put in a good word for himself whenever the opportunity presented itself. There is no argument but that Morse has ability, but he never lets an occasion pass to remind you of it.

We as newspaper men have received lots of news releases on national and political issues from members of congress, but none to our knowledge can surpass Morse in the art of bragging on himself. Since returning to congress with the democrats in the majority, he has sent numerous releases in which the virtues of Morse are extolled.

We do not think there is any question, but that he will align himself with the democrats when the time comes, after he permitted the republican party to finance two campaigns for him. And he will quit the democrats just as quickly if it suits his personal aims.

It is pretty common knowledge over the state that the only reason he ran on the republican ticket in the first place was because he felt the democrats were too poor to elect him. We were rather surprised to hear him mention this in a "Meet the Press" feature a few weeks ago. He likes to brag on where he stands on certain issues, but it looks to us that Morse compromised with an honest principle when he permitted the GOP to finance his campaign, knowing in his own heart he could not support the GOP platform.

"Fuel for Man or Car"

Did you know that a well balanced educational training for your children as future good citizens of this great country of ours is dependent on three important institutions? The home, the church and the public schools—moral, spiritual and secular education. The old home atmosphere of close companionship, happiness and personal responsibility has deteriorated to a great extent in a great many homes of today. It is a place to sleep and change clothes—a glorious hambiscramble each interested only in getting away in pursuit of individual pleasures that in many cases are questionable as to moral wholesomeness.

The church is scorned by a large segment of our population. Many, yes, too many children never attend church or Sunday School and in many cases where they do, neither parent attends. The small percentage of people who study the Bible enough to understand the bare rudiments necessary to render acceptable obedience to the Gospel is alarming indeed.

As to school—too many parents expect the teacher to pour education into the mind of the child, like pouring corn into a sack. To many parents, school is an opportunity to get the kids out of their hair—a public baby sitter.

In most cases the teacher receives no moral support from the parents. Too much freedom, too much pleasure and recreation, not enough work, moral training and individual responsibility.

In all three of these institutions the responsibility of the parent is to lend a guiding hand. If a child is delinquent it is because the parent has failed him in providing love, instruction, advice and discipline when and where needed.

Well about all we can do about it is to sell you a good line of groceries so you can feed them something besides soup and sandwiches.
