Annual Nutrition Meeting Planned Feb. 3-4 at OSC

Forecasts of ample feed supplies for Oregon's 1955 barnyard cafeteria still leave a string of unanswered questions on how the diet should be balanced for most efficient livestock and poultry production.

Latest research findings in feeds and feeding will be reported to Oregon feed and seed dealers at the 13th annual Animal Nutrition conference, February 3 and 4, at Oregon State college.

Lorin E. Harris, Utah State Agricultural college, heads a list of nationally-known feed experts who will address the conference. Recent winner of two major national awards for his nutrition work, Harris will speak on the opening day on supplementary feeding of range livestock. On the second day, he will tell how to use urea protein supplement in cattle feeding.

E. P. Singens, University of Connecticut, will report new scientific trends in poultry nutrition and George S. Templeton, national authority on rabbit production, will discuss rabbit feeding and commercial production of rabbit meat. For the past 20 years, Templeton has directed the U. S. department of agriculture's rabbit experiment station at Fontana, Calif., focal point of the nation's rabbit industry.

Use of minerals in livestock and poultry feeds is scheduled for discussion by three Oregon State college researchers. They are G. H. Arcsott, poultry department; I. R. Jones, dairy; and J. E. Oldfield, animal husbandry. Oldfield will also suggest ways of balancing local feedstuffs for swine production in Oregon.

P. M. Brandt, OSC dairy department head, will review the OSC dairy research program, and J. A. Harper, poultry department, will report on turkey feed research. Harper will also appear with Singens, Harris and Templeton on a panel to answer questions from the audience at the close of the conference.

Other OSC speakers are G. Burton Wood, agricultural economics department head; Roger Sprowls, dairy department; and E. M. Dickinson, poultry department. All sessions will be in Withycombe hall with registration starting February 3 at 9 a.m.

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Quite A Cow!

(Following is information submitted by Paige L. Hall, county extension agent.)

Peterborough, N. H.—A registered Guernsey cow, Linnacres Donna Marie, owned by Sadie A. Lyon, Junction City, Oregon, put 11,519 pounds of milk and 646 pounds of fat into the country's breadbasket. This production represents approximately 5,581 quarts of high-quality milk. This is according to the official Advanced Registry record released by The American Guernsey Cattle Club. "Marie" was a senior four year old and was milked two times daily for 305 days.

Guernsey cows on official test have steadily increased production over the years. The average cow in the United States produces only about one half as much as the average purebred Guernsey on official test.

The sire of "Marie" is Maxim of Prairie Bloom, 16 test daughters of this bull are listed in the Performance Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club.

This record was supervised by Oregon State College.

Farmers Should Obtain Social Security Cards

Are you a farmer or a farm worker that has not obtained your Social Security card? Many people in rural areas do not realize the benefits that can be obtained from new Social Security regulations.

Since a better understanding of this law is needed by many people on the farm, a meeting is being held February 2 at 1 p.m. at the 4-H Club building, county fairgrounds, Eugene, according to W. B. Parker, Lane County extension agent.

Since the new Social Security law now brings federal and old age and survivors insurance to most farm families, the more information that is known about this new program the better each individual farm operator will be when he retires. Effective this month, if you farm for yourself or are a farm worker making \$100 cash wages or more a year, you can be included in this new program.

Social Security, like income tax, is now compulsory and the reports are made at the end of the year when he files his income tax. Farmers pay 3 percent Social Security tax on net earnings from the farm up to \$4,200 a year. The employee on the farm will have 2 percent of his wages deducted up to \$4,200 annually.

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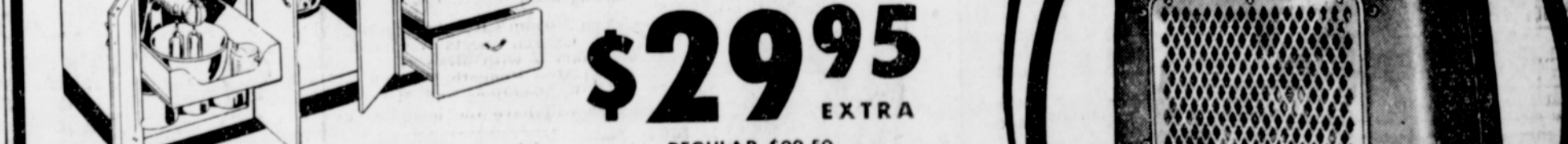
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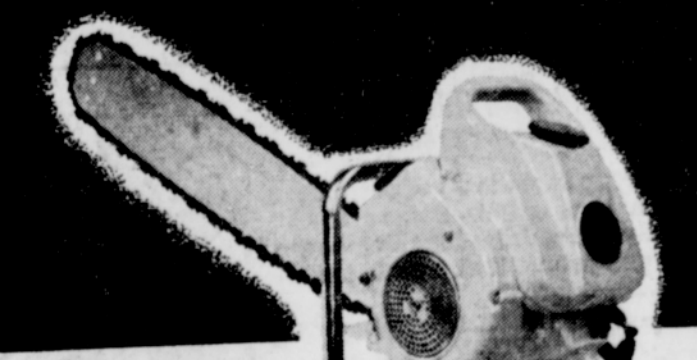
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
