Killed Instantly
Upon report that they had not shown up, the whole coastal route was searched from the air without results. Evidence indicates all were killed instantly by the impact when the plane crashed within a few miles after takeoff.

Jimmie was then living with his grandparents in Washington. He came to Cottage Grove with his father, Frank Howard, about one year after the crash.

Jimmie left Friday to attend the funeral, which was held Tuesday at Bandon. His brothers, Billie, 20, and Larry, 16, living in Washington, and sister, Ellen, 13, from Coquille, also attended the funeral.

Running across the street to Ward's Grocery, Tonole phoned in the fire. Firemen quickly extinguished the flames on the exterior of the house, to which there was comparatively little damage, and proceeded to carry out furniture from the smoke-filled five room structure before quenching the blaze.

Firemen reported that the fire apparently started in the corner of the living room by the flue, got into the wall and mushroomed at the ceiling, spreading throughout the living room.

Estimated loss on the structure of the house was 60 per cent. Estimated loss on contents was 80 per cent. Much of the kitchen appliances were charred beyond salvage. Tonole carried a total of \$7,500 insurance on the structure and contents.

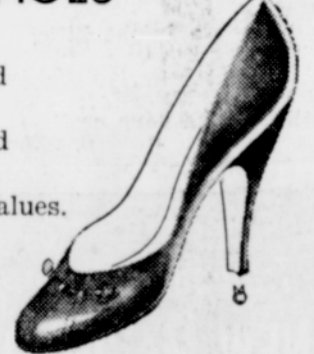
