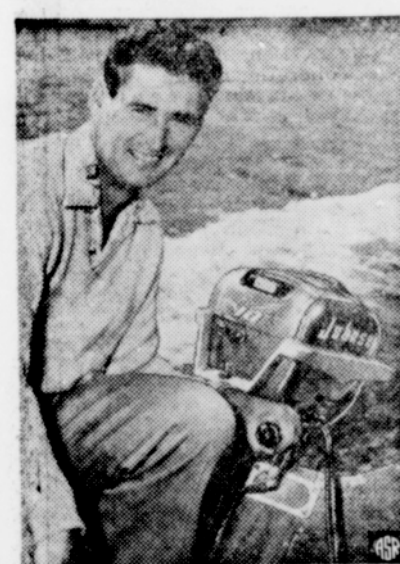

In an effort to help teach youngsters the wheres and whyfores of wildlife conservation, the Oregon State Game Commission has presented a series of wildlife programs in junior and senior high schools throughout the state. "Waterfowl Management," the topic of this season's program, is the fourth in the series and has been preceded by programs on fishery management, big game management, and general conservation. Each program consists of a short talk illustrated with cartoon-like charts and a sound, color movie.

The season's schedule to date has included 118 schools in nearly every part of the state. Representatives of the Information and Education department will visit many more schools before the end of the school year. In most cases the program is booked several months in advance so that an efficient travel itinerary can be planned. Schools in the Coos Bay area are being visited this week, and central Willamette valley schools are scheduled for next week. Teachers and principals have reported their students look forward to each wildlife program. This is one of the educational services provided by the Oregon State Game Commission.

Log Jams Removed On South Coast

Log jam removal on Bald Mountain creek, an important spawning tributary of Elk river in Curry county, has been completed.

Wait Ryckman, field supervisor of stream clearance for the game commission, reports that the stream once again is open for the passage of migratory fish.

The Kerber Logging Company of Langlois, under contract to the game commission, removed five impassable jams from this stream, a favorite spawning stream for salmon and steelhead. Two of the jams were located near the mouth, effectively blocking off the entire stream system. Completion of the clearance work has made approximately 10 miles of main stream plus several miles of tributary water available for spawning.

Another logging concern, the Albertson Logging Company, cleaned out Bear creek, a tributary of Bald mountain.

Work will continue on the south-west coast to remove jams from other streams.

Willamette High Scores Upset Win Over Hapless Grovers in 57-56 Tilt

Willamette Whips CG Frosh 26-16

Cottage Grove's basketball contest with Willamette Friday was further proof of the adage that the game isn't over (or game won) until the gun sounds, as the Wolverines scored nine points in the last 45 seconds of the game to nudge the Grovers 57-56. It was CG's third district loss.

The Lions led from the very beginning, when Ron Rice dumped in a lay-in as the game was but four seconds old, and reached their zenith midway thru the third period when they held a 16 point, 36-20 margin over the visitors.

Willamette garnered the lead in the contest with two seconds remaining, on Bill DeYoung's shot, too late for the Grovers to do anything about it.

Cottage Grove copped a nine point lead in the first period and then ended it with a 17-10 margin. Willamette never came close during the second quarter and by halftime CG racked up a 29-18 bulge, capped by Doug Ballew's super-long swisher 15 feet into the Willamette side of the center line as the horn sounded.

The second half was all Willamette's as the Wolverines piled up 39 counters to CG's 27. Almost as spectacular as Willamette's final period rally was their mid-third quarter comeback. Behind 36-20, Willamette put on a 14 point effort and held CG to a field goal, chopping Grove's lead to 38-34. The Lions, however, rebounded and garnered a 48-38 margin at the end of the frame.

The Wolverines again began to hack down on the lead held by the hot and cold Cottage Grove quintet and narrowed it to a 51-48 margin by mid-quarter.

Willamette Roars

The remainder of Cottage Grove's points came from the gift toss circle. Ballew tossed in a couple of foul shots, Dean Castle added another and Ballew capped CG's scoring for the evening and his 30 point performance with two more free throws.

With 45 seconds remaining, Willamette took its turn at the free throw line and dunked in three, plus a field goal, within 15 seconds. CG took over the ball with a meager 56-53 lead and put on an effective stall, until the last seven seconds. A Grover with his back to the clock took a shot, following shots from the crowd to shoot a Wolverine grabbed the rebound and was fouled. Both shots were good. Grove's incoherent was intercepted. De Young's desperation shot was good and Willamette stood the victor while Cottage Grove fans stood in disbelief.

It was Cottage Grove's fifth one-point loss of the year.
