\$1,000 Allotted Service Center For Needy Families

A sum of \$1,000 has been allotted the Cottage Grove Service Center by the Lane County Community Chest to be used for emergencies, destitute families and those in need in this locality.

The purpose of the Service Center is to integrate and cooperate with all welfare resources in order to more effectively help families and individuals in Cottage Grove and vicinity who are in temporary need of basic help for existence.

Participating groups are all churches and community and civic organizations, while cooperating groups include Red Cross, State Welfare, Salvation Army and Lane County Chest.

Officers of the Cottage Grove Service Center are: the Rev. Lee H. Young, chairman and treasurer; Jess Fasold, administrator and president of ministers and school administrators; Mrs. James Webb, vice chairman; and Mrs. O. H. Tank, acting executive secretary. Budget priority: 1. Food for destitute families in area. 2. Clothing for destitute families in area. (a) Infant and pre-school children. (b) School children: shoes, underclothing and socks. (c) bedding: blankets and sheets. 3. Emergency, medical. 4. Transient care. (a) Stranded families. (b) Individuals. 5. Communications and administration.

Procedure: Resident cases to be reported by schools and participating organizations. Investigation by case worker. The report of the county health nurse will be accepted as adequate investigation.

Transient cases must report to the police department.

Clothing orders to be issued by case workers (including health nurse.) Clothing received at the center, the small room in the upper floor of the city hall on Thursday afternoons. The center in the city hall is manned by representative women of the participating groups under the direction of the vice chairman. Grocery and food orders are to be issued by the

New OCS Program For College Grads Offers Opportunity

SEATTLE (Special)— College graduates with a baccalaureate degree who have not reached their 26th birthday are eligible to apply for acceptance to the U. S. Coast Guard's Officer Candidate school in New London, Conn., officials of the 13th Coast Guard District announced today. The last two classes in fiscal year 1955 convene on February 7th and in early May.

The officer training program offered by the Coast Guard is one of the best. Candidates accepted into the program are required to meet rigid physical and mental standards.

Persons qualified will be enlisted in the Coast Guard Reserve as Seaman Apprentice, Officer Candidate. The selected candidates will then be ordered to a 16-week training course at the Coast Guard Academy in New London. There the OC's will study courses in Navigation, electronics, engineering, ordnance, communications, military law, seamanship, finance and Coast Guard Law Enforcement, to prepare them for duty as line officers. OCS graduates will be ordered to active duty for a period of three years upon being commissioned officers in the Coast Guard Reserve.

College graduates with backgrounds in the fields of engineering and electronics are especially sought for. The Coast Guard's OCS program. There is an opportunity for OCS candidates to put their educational background to practical use as a commissioned officer in the Coast Guard Reserve.
