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Scout Leaders Talk Boy Scouts To Lions Club

Two leaders of the Boy Scouts of the Oregon Trail council were here Thursday as guests of the Cottage Grove Lion's Club. The leaders were Larry Jack, Bohemia area executive and Guy Miller, executive of the Oregon Trail council. Mr. Miller gave a short talk on scouting, telling members of the Lions club the Boy Scout movement was about a half century old. And forty five years ago the organization was issued a charter by the congress of the United States at which time there were only 180,000 scouts as compared to over 4,000,000 now. In discussing the merits of scouting Mr. Miller declared it had accomplished what it set out to do. The Oregon Trail has 9000 registered scouts, more than double in number in the past six years.

Pictures of Camp Tschicoo were shown. This camp opened in June 19, 1953 at a cost of approximately \$150,000.

Annual State Press Conference Sched At UO Campus

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—The 36th annual Oregon Press conference will be held on this campus February 18 and 19. The meeting is sponsored by the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' association and the school of journalism here.

Chairman of this year's conference is Robert B. Chessman of the Astorian-Budget. Included in speakers who have accepted invitations to address the journalists are Irving Dilliard, editor of the editorial page of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch; Palmer Hoyt, publisher of the Denver Post, and Don Belding, chairman of the executive committee, Foote, Cone & Belding at Los Angeles.

The ninth annual Allen Memorial address will be given by Dilliard. University President O. Meredith Wilson will address the delegates and faculty at the Friday luncheon.

At the close of the press meetings, the second ONPA Mechanical conference will be held, on February 19. A series of seven demonstrations of equipment will be given the mechanical men at the University Press.

All sessions of both conferences will be held in Eric W. Allen hall, school of journalism building.
