

Millers Edge CG 60-54 in District Play Friday Nite

Cottage Grove lost its fourth district basketball tilt Friday at Springfield when the Millers edged Grove 60-54 in a nip-and-tuck contest. A scoring spurt in the dying minutes of play sewed up the battle for host Springfield.

The Lions grabbed an early lead and hung on to a thin 9-8 first quarter margin. The lead changed several times before the Grovers finally nailed down a 24-21 halftime edge.

With little more than two minutes into the second half Springfield tied up the contest and then forged ahead 33-28 with three minutes gone. Ballew and Rice, however, began to work on their specialties and soon the score stood 37-36 for the Millers. Bourgeois, who was the big cog in the Miller machine, and Wendell gave Springfield its largest margin in the third quarter with a 42-36 bulge. The Lions managed to cut the margin one point for a 44-39 deficit at the end of the frame.

Two minutes later, buckets by Hayes, Stewart and Castle put Cottage Grove back in the lead, which was enjoyed for the last time that evening. With three minutes gone Springfield gathered eight more markers and a lead within which the Lions came no closer than five points, despite Ballew's three field goal effort.

Bourgeois had a field day for Springfield with 21 counters. Ballew was close behind and paced Cottage Grove with 19 points, followed by Rice with 12 and Castle 10. Pakulak and Dixon shared "second best" honors for the Millers with 13 points each.

A 23 point scoring spree by the Millers in the third period, plus a 62 per cent free throw average for Springfield (compared to Grove's 47 per cent effort) were determining factors of the Lion loss.

No Noise For Ted



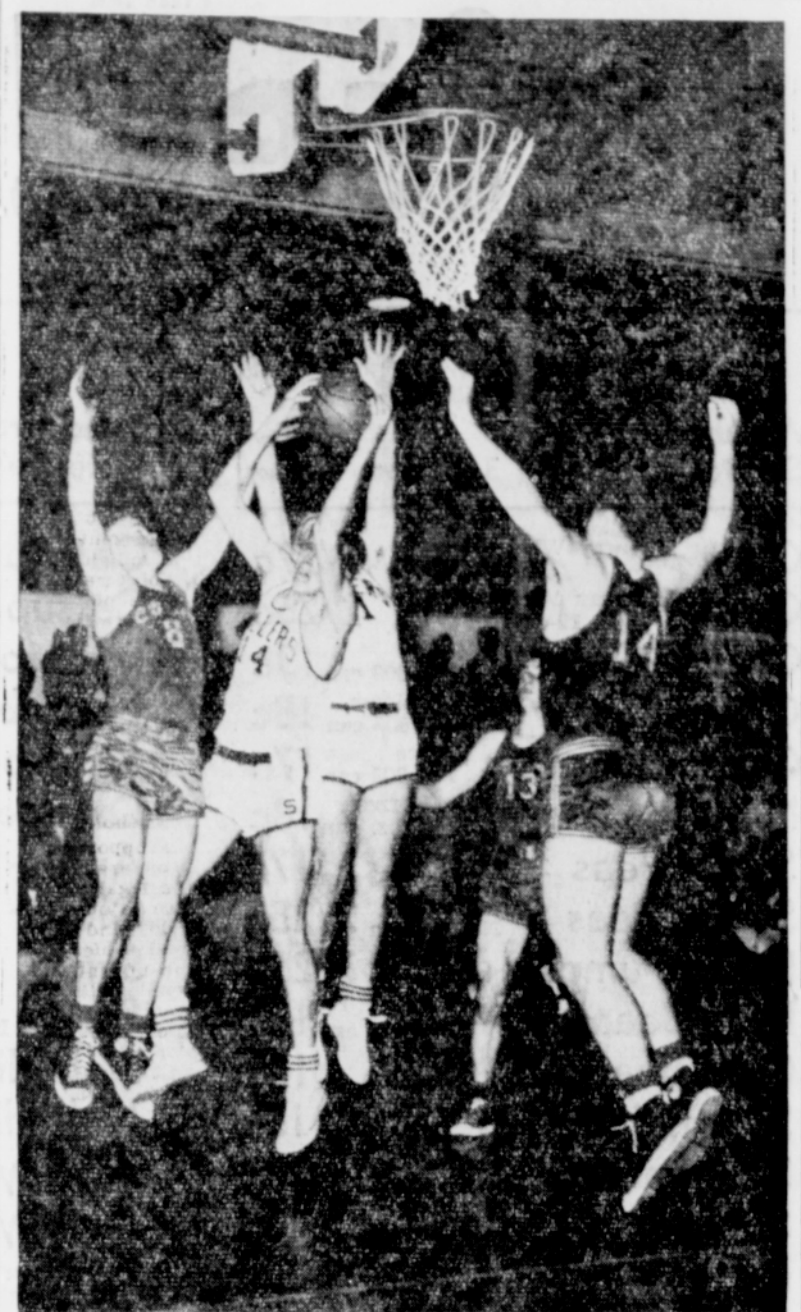

Random Sampling Survey to Be Made

"The success of determining hunting season kill rests upon your individual cooperation," so reads part of the letter from P. W. Schneider, state game director, to 5,250 Oregon hunters.

These hunters are ones holding hunting licenses with numbers that correspond to numbers selected several years ago by use of mechanical equipment of the Oregon State Game Commission.

A letter and questionnaire is sent to these hunters, and the information thus obtained is correlated with other facts gathered to determine the harvest of game birds and mammals in Oregon for 1954.

Since few hunters get the same license number each year, it is possible to use the numbers selected for a number of years.

The questionnaires will be sent out within the next few weeks, and the game commission asks that the hunters receiving them aid the survey by filling out and returning the questionnaires as soon as possible.

Time to Put Up Wood Duck Boxes

If you've been building wood duck boxes during the winter, now is the time to get out and start putting them up for the ducks.

But hold it a minute—before you start nailing them on just any old tree, here are a few tips for making the most usable by the ducks.

Mel Cummings, game agent for the Oregon State Game Commission, in checking 30 boxes put up in Multnomah county, found a number of points that made many of the boxes of little value to the ducks.

17 Boxes Well Located
A total of 17 of the boxes were well located. Of the remainder, two were placed too close to the ground. Boxes should be about 15 feet above the ground.

Two boxes had been placed in dead trees which later had fallen over. Two boxes had no lids or roofs on them.

One box was sitting directly on a limb which provided a ready and convenient runway for predators to enter the box. Still another was placed so that there was brush in front of the hole, making it almost impossible for the ducks to enter. Finally, five of the boxes were mounted so that the front side of the box sloped back. This position makes it impossible for the ducklings to get out of the box.

Sloughs Good Locations
Cummings also comments that back-water sloughs are better water areas than the main channels of rivers for box locations.

It is suggested that the boxes be put up now so they will have time to weather before time for the ducks to move in.

Hunting Accidents Run High for '54

The specter of death and disability hangs over a wide swath of Oregon's hunters during 1954 season. According to figures compiled by the Oregon State Game Commission, 13 persons were shot fatally and 37 wounded nonfatally during the past 12 months. However, the commission points out that the methods used in collecting information regarding hunting accidents has become more efficient, and the total of 50 accidents recorded for 1954 is not as large an increase as might be indicated by casual comparison to previous years.

First fatal accident of 1954 took place when a 23-year-old Navy veteran was riding in a pick-up while carrying a loaded rifle. The rifle discharged, sending a bullet thru his head. Final fatality was caused on December 29 when a youth from Utah was hunting waterfowl in the Snake river area and his loaded shotgun discharged as he pulled it from his automobile.

Other accidents recorded were also much the same as ones took place in former years. One apparent cause of the increased number of recorded accidents was the large number of shotgun wounding during the pheasant season. Thirteen persons were victims of careless shotgun handling. Other categories ran about the same as during 1953.

A complete breakdown of the accidents for the year will be issued by the game commission at a later date.

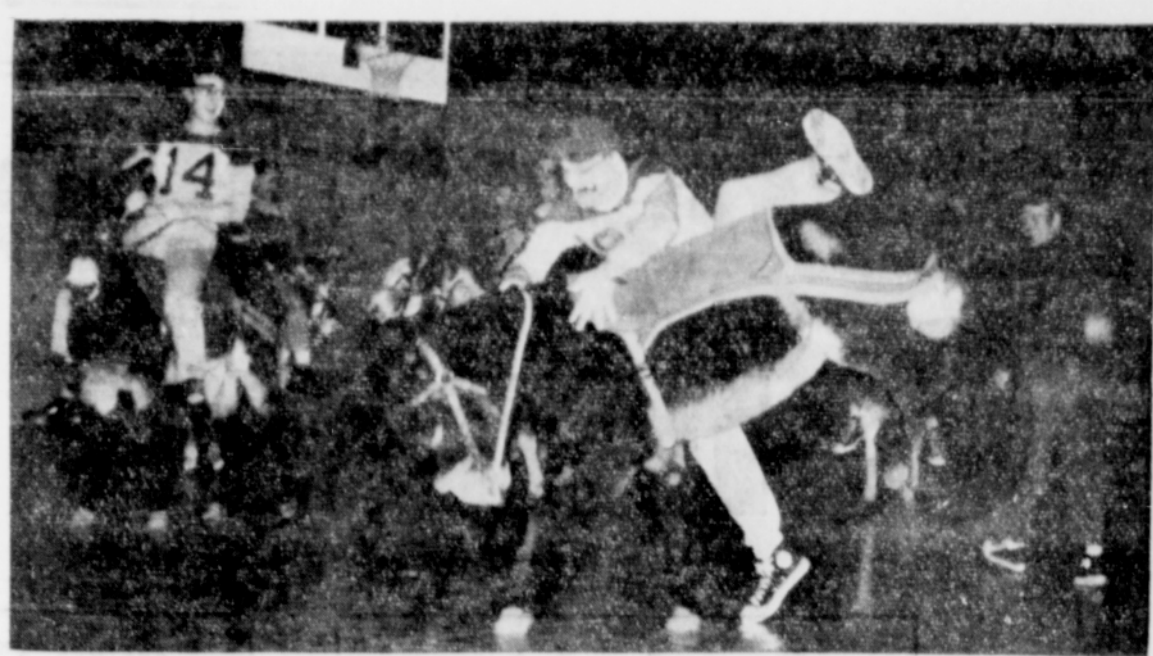
Pointing out the importance of including the spinal column in every health examination, Dr. W. C. Campbell, professor of surgery at the University of Tennessee, writes in his "Textbook of Orthopedic Surgery":

"The spine should be included by every routine physical examination as nerves pass through the vertebral foramina (spinal outlets) from the spinal cord to all parts of the body. In consequence, symptoms simulating many affections may be referred to the periphery when the pathology is present in the spine."

Lions Subdue Warriors 56-45 For 3rd District Win of Season

Cottage Grove made it three wins in the district play win column Tuesday night as the Lions defeated the Oakridge Warriors, 56-45 on the Lion court.

Scrappy guard Byron Angell put up the shot early in the first period that put the Grovers back in the lead, 8-6, which was never lost or threatened. The contest was fairly uneventful and gave coach Donn Gassaway a chance to give his reserves some action.

The Lions put up an air-tight defense in the first half and forced the Warriors to long, ineffective pot shots at the bucket. CG piled up a 16-6 first quarter lead and extended the margin to 18 points, 29-11 by halftime.

Larry Burleson layed in a crumple in the early minutes of the second half to give Grove its largest margin of the evening, a 20 point 33-13 bulge. From here Oakridge began to hack away at the lead.

Oakridge gathered 17 markers in the third frame and reduced the Lion's lead to 42-28. The Warriors began to find the range of their shots from outside in the last quarter and twice cut Grove's lead to nine counters, 46-37 and 54-45. Ron Rice sunk two gift tosses at the close of the contest to give Cottage Grove the 11 point win.

Altho scoring only four points in the game, Byron Angell was

the sparkplug for the Lions. Angell played a very effective defensive game and set up numerous plays and assists.

Big Dean Castle was hot on his hooks and paced the Lions with 20 markers, followed closely by Ballew with 19. Shearer led Oakridge with 16 points and Tirrill contributed 12.

Oregon's wintering waterfowl were counted last week thru the efforts of the Oregon State Game Commission and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Oregon State Police.

The count, an annual affair, was one part of a tabulation that took place thruout the Pacific Flyway during the same week. During this week, an attempt was made to count all of the waterfowl in the Pacific Flyway. By making the count simultaneously in all of the states and Canada, an accurate total can be obtained as to the

number of waterfowl in the flyway. Federal and state game management agencies cooperated in the project, and field men from all of these organizations took part in the actual counting.

Initial returns of the material gathered in Oregon indicate that there is a normal density of wintering waterfowl in the state, according to John McKean, chief of the game division for the Oregon State Game Commission.

Reports from other parts of the flyway indicate that a majority of the birds are now in California.

Complete compilation of the figures will be carried on by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and detailed results of the count will be available at a later date.

37,000 Waterfowl Killed by Hunters

Over 37 thousand waterfowl fell to the guns of hunters using the public shooting grounds during the 1954 season.

Final figures as compiled by the Oregon State Game Commission show that 37,038 ducks and geese were taken on the four public shooting grounds by 19,467 permit holders.

Summer Lake public shooting grounds led the way with hunters there averaging approximately 2.5 birds per man during the season for a total of 17,149 duck and geese.

15,728 Dead Ducks
Runner-up for total number of birds taken was Sauvie Island with a total kill of 15,778; however, the average success ratio there was considerably lower because of the great number of hunters utilizing the area. Hunters swarmed the area, and at the end of the season 9,957 permits had been issued. This gave the hunters on the island an average of 1.59 birds per man.

Second for average success was Warner Valley with 1,615 hunters averaging 1.69 birds per man for the season total of 2,734 ducks and geese.

As predicted, Malheur shooting grounds brot up the rear with 990 hunters averaging 1.39 birds per man for a total of 1,377 waterfowl.

Both Sauvie Island and Summer Lake were used by more hunters than ever before and both areas provided more birds to the bag than in any previous year. At Summer Lake there were 1,600 more hunters than the highest year in the past. They took over 800 more birds than any previous season's total.

290 Hunters
On the Sauvie Island area past totals were surpassed by over 200 hunters and 1,400 birds.

State-wide totals show that approximately 600 more birds were taken from the shooting grounds than during the last year. The average birds per hunter increased from 1.53 in 1953 to 1.77 in 1954 for all of the areas, and the shooting ground provided almost 850 more shooting days for hunters than in 1953.

As to species taken, snow geese were the most numerous bird bagged, totaling 9,416, followed by baldpate, mallard, pintail, and green-winged teal in that order. Least common were the old squaw ducks and the mallard-pintail crosses. Two each of these were taken at Sauvie Island.

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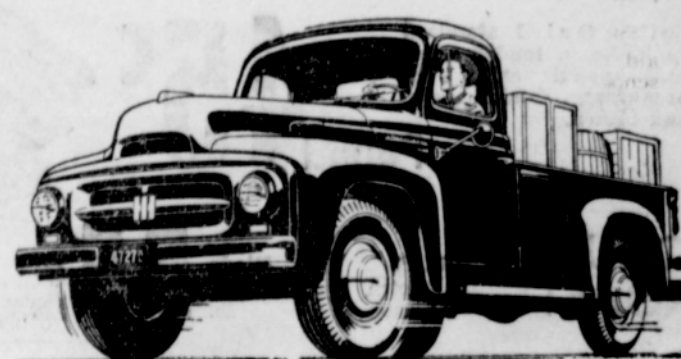
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
