

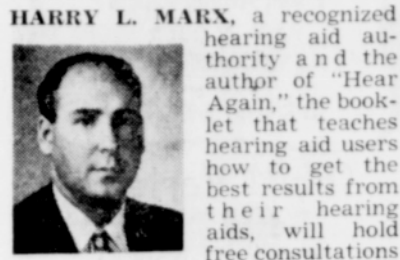

More for Taxes Than for Food

The prices we pay for the food we eat are greatly affected by taxes. About \$1 out of every \$5 that a housewife spends on food goes for taxes of one kind or another.

Americans today are paying out far more for taxes than for food, although as recently as 1939 the exact reverse was true. In 1954, the tax bill amounted to about \$85-billion, compared to \$64-billion for food; in 1939, taxes took only \$12½-billion, and \$16-billion went for food.

Mosby Creek Folk Go to Mexico, Fly to Guatemala

MOSBY CREEK—Mr. and Mrs. Jess Forester returned last week from a 33-day trip between eight and nine thousand miles to Los Angeles, Tucson, Ariz., and on to Mexico City. From there they flew to Guatemala where they met Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Farman of Cottage Grove. Forester and Farman took a plane to a large plantation owned by a Mr. Coner, where they looked at a big holding of timber. The timber there is mostly cypress, oak, pine and other hardwood. They also saw big fields of pineapples, bananas and coffee and beautiful orchids growing wild everywhere. All the road building for logging is done by hand by natives who work for 8 cents an hour. They report summer weather the year around with rainfall very light but when they have a heavy rain it does a lot of damage. Mr. Forester expects to go back soon to look over more timber.

"Matsonstrasse" is so titled to honor the late Private Roy T. Mattson of (Route 2) Braham, Minn., a bulldozer operator killed when a World War II land mine exploded under his vehicle.

Mattson and other members of his 291st Heavy Equipment Company were excavating for water lines in a new housing area for refugees and displaced persons from communist zones when the land mine was detonated.

Before his body was returned to the United States for burial, a delegation of Busenbach officials paid tribute to him and his comrades for their aid in the construction project.

'Name That Rose' Contest Now Open

The Roses for Portland Committee, composed of civic, business and rose organizations, is sponsoring the 2nd annual "Name the Rose Contest." The idea is to encourage "Plant, Grow and Show Rose Gardens" and keep "Portland the City of Roses" foremost among other cities of the nation, who are striving desperately to forge ahead of us. All Oregonians are urged to support this far-flung movement to preserve the City of Roses for our state.

Starting February 6, in an effort to make the public aware of this situation, the "Name the Rose Contest," is being promoted by the Roses for Portland Committee. The Grand Prize award will be a vacation stay at an Oregon resort for the winner and his immediate family, plus a garden of rose bushes to be planted for the winner.

There will be other outstanding

prizes for second, third and fourth place winners. Rose bushes will be awarded to the daily winners and the winners of these will be eligible for the final Grand Prize.

Contest Rules
1. Contestants are to supply an original name for the hybrid rose described as "a tall, vigorous plant with large glossy leaves and long-pointed buds of deep pink which open to cup-shape with a color of subtle pink. Medium size blooms sometimes reaching a diameter of six inches, petals vary from 21 to 28, fragrance is spicy. In addition to naming the rose, contestants are required to complete the following sentence in 25 words or less: "I choose the name _____ because _____"

2. A separate card or letter is required for each entry.

3. Entries should be addressed to: Roses for Portland, 1020 S. W. Front Avenue, Portland 1, Oreg.

4. Contest starts Sunday, February 6, 1955, and closes Friday, February 18, 1955, at 5 p.m. Daily competition will be limited to those entries received by 5 p.m.

5. Entries will be judged on originality, aptness, sincerity, and neatness.

6. A committee of qualified authorities will serve as judges of the contest, and their decisions will be final.

7. Any person will be eligible to participate in the contest except members of the Roses for Portland committee and their immediate families.

8. All entries become the property of the Roses for Portland committee, and none of them will be returned.

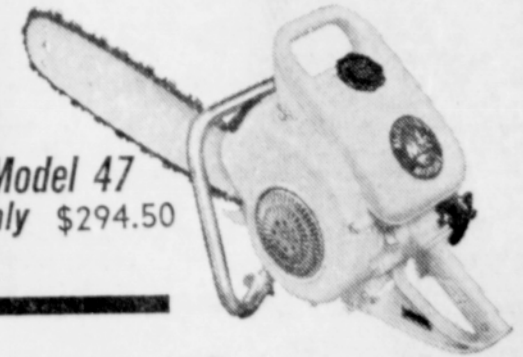
9. Prizes will be awarded to the winners on February 21, 1955 at the Winter Rose Rally to be held in the Lincoln High School auditorium.

10. In the event of ties, duplicate prizes will be awarded.

11. Winners will be notified by mail.

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
