Rice Sinks 15-Footer to Give Grove 44-42 Victory Over Roseburg Friday

Cool-headed Ron Rice pumped in a 15-foot howitzer with five seconds left in the contest to break a 42-42 deadlock and hand Cottage Grove a thrilling 44-42 win over Roseburg at the Indian court Friday night. The win evened the score with the Indians, who came from behind to nip CG 42-41 earlier in the season.

Roseburg opened the fourth period with a 40-35 lead, and when Cottage Grove tied the score up 40-40, the Indians evened things by tying themselves up in something besides the score.

Roseburg's only field goal of the frame came with 1:45 left, when Howard Backen's corner shot fell thru the hoop. That tied it up 42-42 and led to hysteria in the remaining time of play.

Ball Control Sought

Coaching strategy on the part of both benches at this stage was to control the ball until the last possible moment for the all-important shot. Cottage Grove had two chances to control and Roseburg one.

The Lions controlled until 1:03 remained, when substitute Ron Sanders stole a long Lion pass. Following a Roseburg strategy timeout, the Indians controlled until 25 seconds remained when Bill Oerding, driving for the basket, was fouled by Doug Ballew.

Oerding failed on both attempts and Cottage Grove controlled the rebound to get its chance for a reprieve. Waiting until five seconds showed on the clock, Rice unhooked from 15 feet straight thru the hoop.

Grove Rebounds
CG came from behind to finish the first period with an 11-10 lead. Roseburg at one time was up by 8-1. The play of Ballew was instrumental for the Lions here.

In the second canto, Roseburg scorched the floors with a 20 point scoring attack, while Grove gathered 11, to give the host Indians a 30-22 halftime bulge.

The Lions outpointed Roseburg 13-10 in the third chapter, but there was no sign of collapse on either side. The Indians managed to stay ahead thruout the period and ended the eight minutes with its 40-35 advantage.

The Lions batted less than .333

at the gift toss circle, while Roseburg shot four for ten. Ballew and Biddington shared high point honors with 14 counters. Rice followed Ballew with nine.

Indians Sca'l CG JV Five 46-28 Fri.

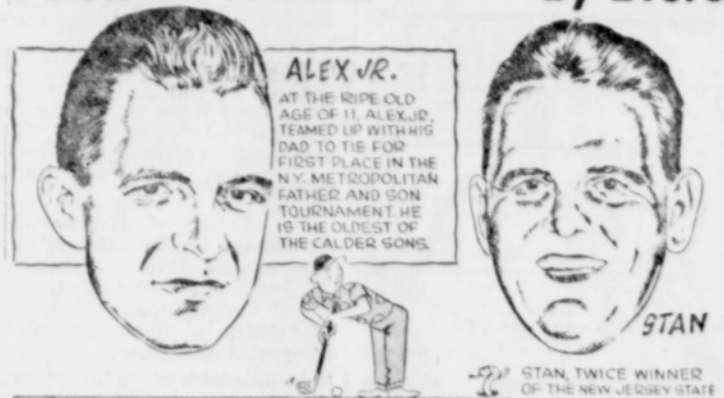
Roseburg's Jayvee quint won its 13th game of the season by defeating Cottage Grove's "B" hoop club 46-28 Friday night in the Indian court.

Migration Mystery To Be Solved Soon

Some of the mystery of steelhead migration in upper Columbia river tributaries may be cleared up by a fish-tagging operation conducted by the Oregon fish commission last week at McNary dam.

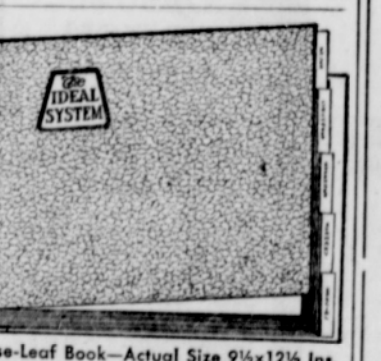
Thru cooperation of the Corps of Engineers, fish commission biologists were able to tag 464 adult steelhead which apparently had taken up residence in the upper pools of the Washington shore highway at McNary dam. In all, 684 of the overgrown rainbows were removed from the fishway which had been partially drained for maintenance and repair work.

Tip-off that steelhead would probably be in the Washington fishway came last month when 1,571 "homesteading" steelhead were found in the Oregon shore ladder when it was dismantled for an annual check. Why some of the upriver-bound steelhead decide to hang out in fishladders is not definitely known according to Harry L. Rietze, fish commission biologist in charge of Columbia river investigations. Rietze said steelhead have also been found in Bonneville dam fishways during annual maintenance checks.

The Oregon biologist now hopes that recoveries of the McNary tagged steelies will be reported in order to clear up some of the questions concerning steelhead migration above McNary which has puzzled fisheries workers. The opportunity to tag a large number of fish in a short period of time fits in well with an over-all study of Columbia river steelhead migration which the fish commission has undertaken, Rietze stated.

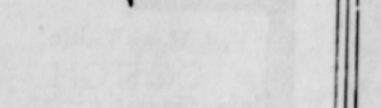

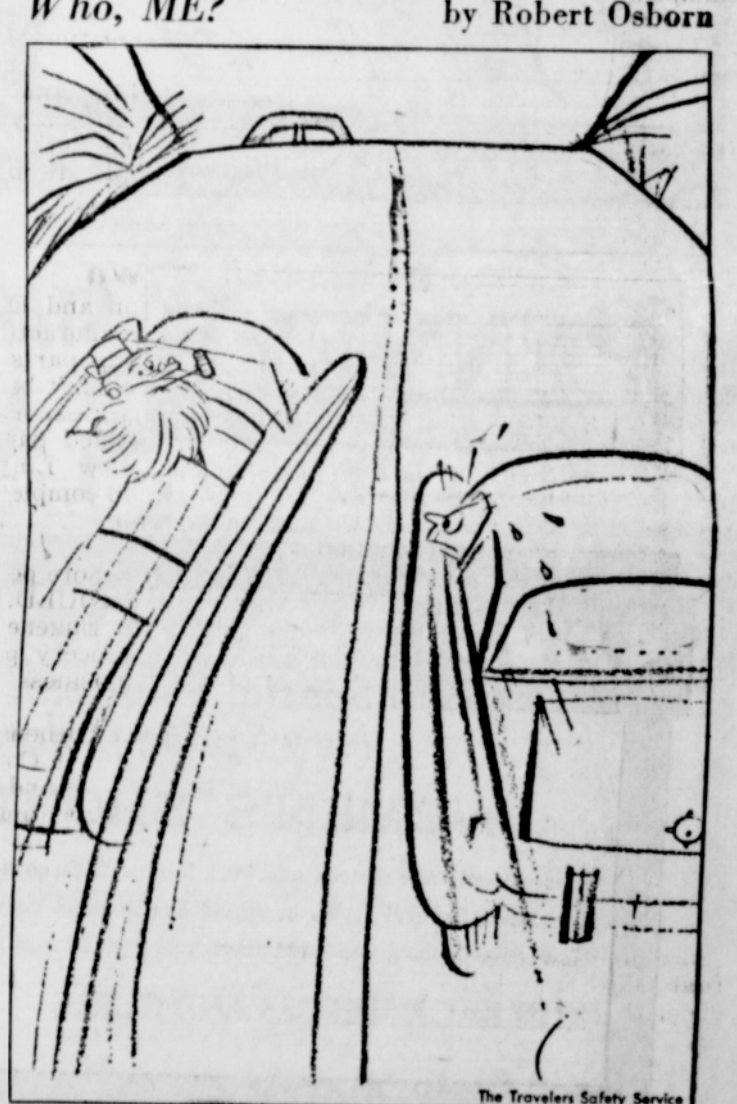

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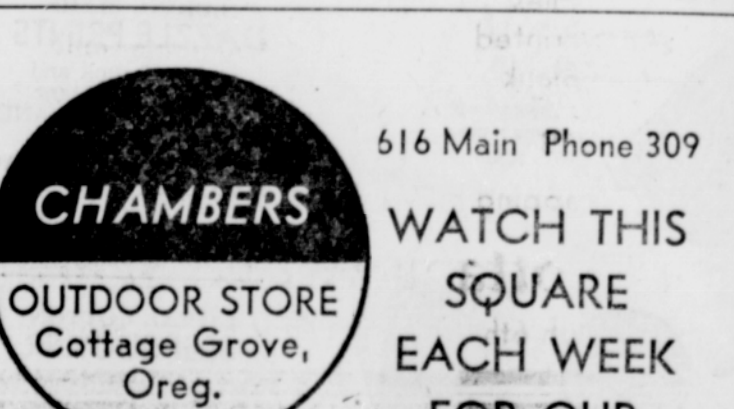
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
