"What's New" Is Topic for 2-Day Institute Oregon State Nurses Assn.

All registered nurses living in this area are urged to attend the two-day institute being held in Eugene February 23 and 24, at the Sacred Heart Hospital auditorium. The program, with the theme "What's New," has been arranged by members of District No. 5, Oregon State Nurses Association.

Any graduate nurse registered in any state or territory affiliated with the American Nurses Association is eligible to attend by payment of the \$1 registration fee. For members of the Oregon State Nurses Association the fee will be 50c and presentation of their 1935 membership card. Registration will open at 8:30 a.m. with the program to start at 9 daily.

The two-day educational program consists of lectures by qualified physicians, surgeons and nurses who are experts in their particular field. Topics to be presented include neurological nursing, arthritis, chest surgery, internal medicine, pediatrics, orthopedics, care of burns, psychiatry, psychology and cancer.

New Equipment, Films Shown
There will be demonstrations of

respirators, splints, use of plastics in the hospital, etc. A number of films will be shown, some of which were made locally of interesting and unusual cases. An afternoon is being devoted to the study of cancer, and is being presented by the American Cancer Society. The Lane County Civil Defense Agency has charge of the Wednesday evening program. The various pharmaceutical houses will have free literature and supplies for all those attending.

A dinner is being arranged for Wednesday, at which time Miss Marjorie Elmore RN, OSNA executive secretary, and Mrs. Nova Young RN, OSNA legislative committee chairman, will discuss changes being formulated in the Nurse Practice Act to bring it more in keeping with modern nursing procedures and practice. Reservations for this must be in by February 19.
