Stream Improvement Job Aids Migratory Fish

Recent stream improvement work by the Oregon fish commission has facilitated migratory fish passage in two important river systems, according to H. C. Warren, head of the fish commission engineering division.

On Deep Creek, a tributary of the Clackamas river, the abandoned Buzz mill dam near Boring was removed. Warren stated that stream clearance work has also been done lately on the Clatskanie river system. One large log jam was removed from the main Clatskanie a mile below the falls. Additional debris removal was done over a 2 1/2 mile section of Carus creek, a main tributary of the Clatskanie river.

The entire Clatskanie system was cleared of barriers in 1949, however Warren said maintenance work must still be performed each year to prevent formation of new jams.

Hudson Bay Irrigation Dam Will Get Fishway

State Fisheries Director M. T. Hoy announced this week that a fishway and fish-protection screen will soon be installed at the Hudson Bay Irrigation district dam on the Walla Walla river near Milton-Freewater.

Hoy said the improvements are being made through cooperative efforts of the irrigation district, the Oregon state game commission, and the Oregon fish commission. Under present agreement, the irrigation district will finance both of the fish facilities. Plans for the screens will be provided by the game commission, and the fish commission will furnish plans for the fishway.

The eight-foot high diversion dam has been a complete block to adult steelhead at low water stages the fisheries head explained.

Hoy also announced that the fish commission will provide plans for a new fishway at a water diversion dam on the Lostine river, a tributary of the Walla Walla river. This dam is seven feet high and is owned by the city of Lostine, which has agreed to construct the fishway. Hoy said the present temporary fishway at the dam is inadequate at certain water stages in providing access to fish utilizing the 15 miles of spawning area above the dam.

State and local organizations in the south are expected to spend \$10,000,000 this year in promoting economic and technological programs in this land.
