

Soldier Bronco-Buster Bites Dust 932 Times

BERLIN—U.S. Army Private Kenneth Bryant of Arvada, Colo., holds a record few, if any, can match—he has been thrown from horses 932 times.

Bryant was a professional bronco rider for 18 years. He began at the age of eight.

The burly, bow-legged rodeo rider has incurred in his career a broken right arm, a broken hip, and four broken ribs.

"But I've been lucky," he said. "My brother and uncle were killed bronco busting."

Bryant isn't eligible to join the Berlin Military Police horse platoon.

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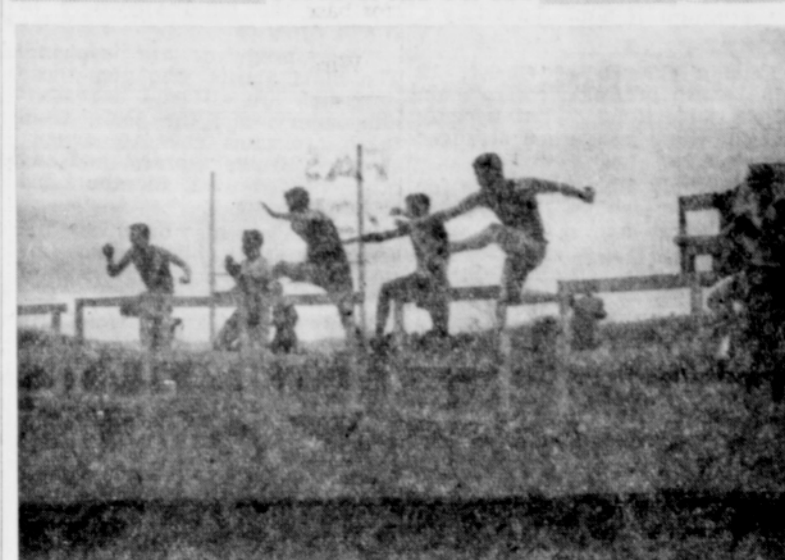

Grove Track Coach Sees Large Turnout

The Lions have a turnout of about 80 prospective tracksters for the current season headed by 11 returning lettermen, according to Coach Bob Dusenberry. Back for more action are pole vaulters, Jay Wilson and Doug Ballew; sprinters, Greg Stewart, Dean Cranmer, Bill Bryson and Tom Long; distance runners, Carl Davidson and Charles Coston; and weight men, Dean Castle, Jim Childers and Larry Burleson.

The Lions have the depth to score well in the relay meets and the dual meets, but will encounter difficulty in the larger meets, Dusenberry stated. Looking good in work-outs so far have been Jay Wilson, who placed second in the pole vault at the state meet last spring; Greg Stewart, sprints; Doug Ballew and Jim Hewes, hurdles; and Dean Castle in the shot.

Baptist Quintet Garners Perfect 11-Win Record

There was a tie for fourth place between the Church of God, coached by Homer Gates, and the Lutherans, Rev. Kunz coach. Buzz Wyant's Methodist fifth, Presbyterian quint, handled by Ed Moseley and the Latter Day Saints, headed by Pat Murphy, followed in that order.

Successful Program

Pulpwood Industry Always to Depend On Small Woodlots

The nation's pulpwood industry will always depend upon the small woodlot owner for a major portion of its raw material, notwithstanding the fact that industry is now spending some \$14,400,000 a year in management of its own forest lands.

The importance of the individual landowner in meeting the nation's demand for pulpwood is pointed up in a new booklet, "Pulpwood Industry Facts," just issued by American Forest Products Industries, national sponsor of the American Tree Farm System and the Keep America Green fire prevention campaign.

"Most of the pulpwood comes from small ownerships and farm woodlots owned by more than 4-222,000 persons," the booklet points out. "It is probable that the number of people who grow and sell pulpwood in the nation runs into the millions."

In the five recognized pulpwood-producing regions, the proportions supplied by farmers and other small landowners is listed as follows: Appalachian, 60 per cent; South, 70 per cent; North-east, 30 to 50 per cent; Lake States, 50 per cent; Western Region, "a small amount."

Pulp companies, which own or lease only 6 per cent of the nation's commercial forest lands, will always have to buy millions of cords of pulpwood annually from farmers, even after their own lands reach capacity production some 25 years hence. In view of this, the thousand-or-more technically-trained foresters now employed by pulpwood companies are giving increasing attention to providing technical assistance to farmers and small landowners who otherwise might not obtain it.

Neuberger Oregon Office Now Open

Senator Richard L. Neuberger announced his Oregon office opening on Tuesday, March 21, in Room 502, New Fiedner Building, Portland, to provide "facilities for better serving the problems and interests of Oregon people." For the present the office hours will be from 10 to 5 Monday thru Friday.

Neuberger will use the office as his headquarters when he is in Oregon, and at other times the Portland staff will be in direct contact with the Senator thru his Washington office. The Oregon Senator said that it was necessary for him to take space in a private building because the General Service Administration informed him no space was available in the U. S. Courthouse in Portland, where Oregon senators previously had been allotted offices.

Elizabeth C. Ducey, active in the League of Women Voters and Jane Jefferson Club, will be in charge of the office. She will be assisted by Mary Margaret Gibson, and Mrs. Louie Svihla, who will be in charge of volunteers helping in the office.

"Because Washington D. C. is nearly 3000 miles away from Oregon, many people must feel that it is a remote and distant place," Neuberger said. "The Oregon office will be useful in overcoming this feeling of isolation and will serve an important function by providing facilities for better serving problems and interests of Oregon people. The office in the New Fiedner Building will be a place close to home where Oregon people can bring their questions on legislative matters."

The New Fiedner Building is located at 1017 S. W. Washington Street.
