Children Major Factor in Oregon Bike Accidents

Seven bicyclists were killed and 307 injured in 1954 in Oregon, according to a report from the Secretary of State's traffic safety division. Seventy-nine percent were in the age bracket of five to 14 years.

In the total of 314, only 31 girls five to 14 years old were involved in accidents. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry suggested that parents and teachers go over the safety rules that apply to bicycles with the children who ride. He pointed out that bicyclists must assume more of the responsibility for keeping out of accidents.

Approximately three of four riders injured in motor vehicle collisions were violating some traffic regulation, statewide records show.

Millions For Mastitis

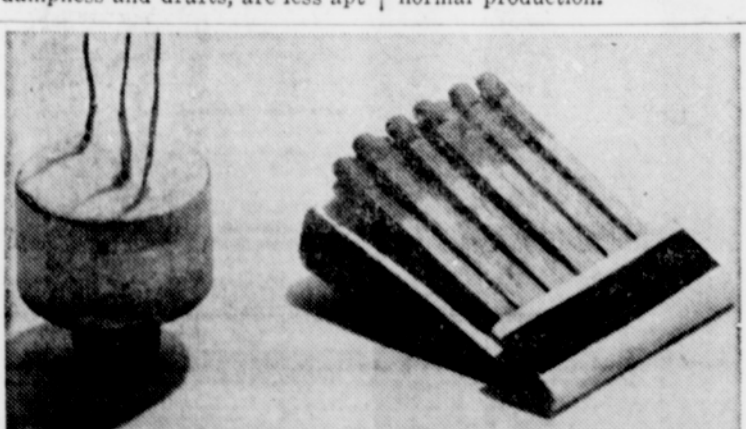


The nation's dairy farmers are being robbed of 200 million dollars this year. The thief is a stubborn, puzzling disease called bovine mastitis. An inflammation of the udder, mastitis is commonly caused by the same type of germ responsible for "strep" throat in humans. The disease is usually classified as either acute or chronic. In acute mastitis, the animal will run a high temperature, lose her appetite and may stop giving milk. Chronic mastitis is hard to diagnose and may flare up at intervals. It is frequently spread in secret to other herd animals.

Some bruise or damage to the udder generally precedes an outbreak, although sudden change in weather or feed may also play a part. If allowed to go unchecked, mastitis may be fatal or it may do permanent damage to the udder, leaving scar tissue in place of productive milk tissue.

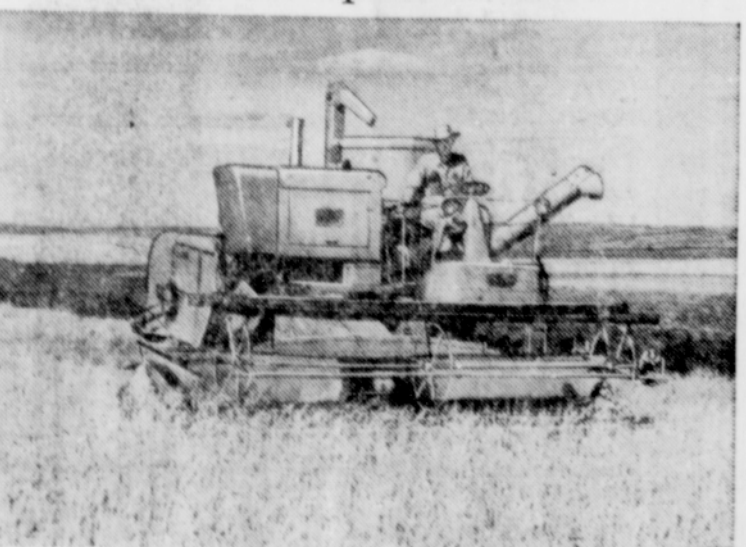
Mastitis May Be Prevented Careful sanitary practices and good farm management reduce the chances of an outbreak. Dairy cattle, if kept well bedded and out of dampness and drafts, are less apt to contract the infection. Immediate attention to minor injuries also serves to prevent mastitis.

Antibiotic Hits Infection Terramycin, if administered in time, generally destroys the infection and leaves the infected quarter undamaged. The antibiotic is suspended in a water base and packaged for easy udder infusion. Although antibiotics have been prepared in oil or jelly base materials, recent experiments by scientists at the Pfizer Experimental Farm in Terre Haute, Indiana, proved that water infusions yielded the best results. Terramycin, in many cases, cleared up mastitis infections within 12 to 24 hours. The scientists found that it could be milked out sooner than an oil or jelly base antibiotic, returning the cow to perfect health and normal production.

New Self-Propelled Combine



A self-propelled combine with new handling ease, new operator comfort and convenience, new strength and wearability and new crop-handling efficiency has been announced by Minneapolis-Moline Company. Important among the features of the new combine, called the SP-168 POWERflow Harvester, are power steering and hydraulic POWERflow drive for easy change of ground speed without changing the speed of the harvesting mechanism. New automotive-type clutch lets the operator completely separate drive unit from transmission for smooth and easy shifting. New one-lever concave adjustment permits the operator to change the concave opening in seconds and return to any setting. A rock trap protects the cylinder and concave. The cylinder has a double chain drive. Header height is hydraulically controlled from 2 to 41 inches. The new self-propelled combine is available with a 12-, 13-, or 14-foot cutter bar. Also available for the combine is a new 8-foot floating pick-up header.

More Snow But Less Moisture In Bohemia Area

Snowfall is greater in the Bohemia area this spring, but the water content of the snow is less. Clair Hogate of the Rujada ranger station said Saturday snow measurements at the Bohemia station on April 1 measured 96.6 inches with a water content of 31.5. In 1954 at the corresponding period snow measured 84.1 inches with a water content of 37.0.
