The council voted to apply to the secretary of state for special census to be taken of the recently acquired area west of town.

A representative of a Cottage Grove septic tank firm was present to bid for a franchise to operate in Creswell. Since the firm is already operating under a franchise here to expire July 1 the party was requested to return at that time.

Misses Wanda Carnahan, Nina Speht and Pat Nelson.

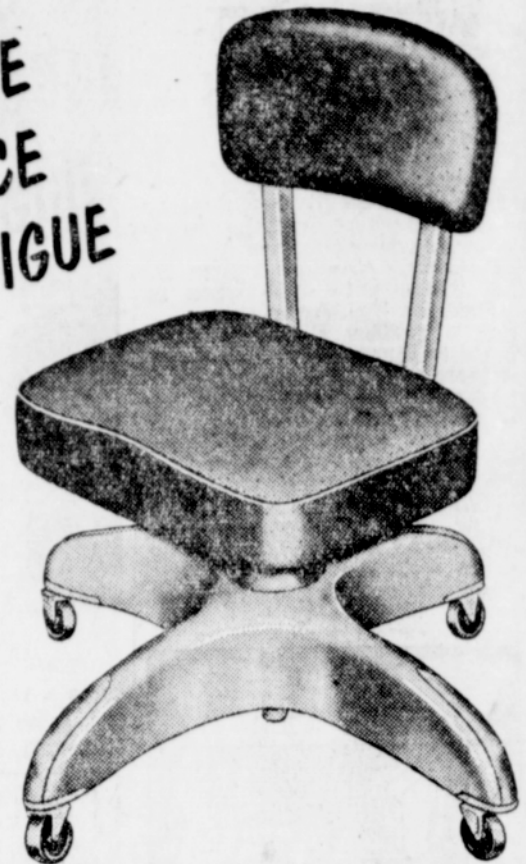
