## CG Lions Place Third in High Schools at Willamette Relays

### Fort Sill Wildlife Group Just Has Too Many Deer Friends

FORT SILL, Okla. — The 4,000 members of the Fort Sill Fish and Wildlife Association, who devote their off-duty hours to the propagation of game on this 77,000-acre military reservation, are faced with an over-propagation problem.

The deer population has doubled in the last year—and this despite a hunting season which accounted for 233 for the group.

By Army helicopter count, there are some 2,500 head in the present herd and that brings things to quite a head, according to the human way of thinking at the Artillery Center.

Which is why the fish and wildlife association members are busy finding foster homes for their four-footed friends. Live traps scattered over the reservation are the first step on a journey which will take the excess deer to Fort Campbell and Fort Knox. The Kentucky posts are short in this commodity.

While depleting the deer population, association members, who finance their projects through membership fees, are building up the game bird and fish population.

More than 2,600 quail and 850 pheasants were released this year and new hatchlings of both are being incubated continuously. Dams on Lake George and West Lake are being repaired and temporarily enlarged to attract more birds and provide improved breeding grounds for fish.

In addition, the association planted more than 37,000 trees and seedlings for cover and put in some 40 acres of German millet, higer and other small grain to feed local birds and migrants. Duck foods have been planted in tanks and lakes on the reservation.

At Fort Sill, as on all other Army installations where such sport is possible, hunting and fishing are encouraged off-duty activities. Both keep the soldier on post—and off the highways—and hunting helps maintain his skill with the rifle.

Cottage Grove Lions fared well in the annual Willamette Relays at Salem last Saturday as they picked up 71 4/5 points to place third in scoring in competition with 65 Oregon and Washington high schools.

The relays are unique in that each heat of a race is a final and that as far as possible in the running events and relays the contestants are bracketed by school size.

All contestants competed together in the field events regardless of size although divided by two divisions of novice, those who had not lettered, and seniors, those who had lettered in the event.

Some of the field events were long, wearing sessions with the pole vault, for instance, starting at 5 p.m. and finished at 8:30 p.m., as 147 contestants had to be weeded out.

Approximately 2,500 high school and college athletes participated in the events that were run off on a cold, windy session that held times and distances down.

The Groves encountered bad luck in their relay events as two dropped batons cost them places in the 440 yard and 880 yard relays. The locals had a 15 yard lead at the halfway mark in the latter race when the fumble occurred on an exchange. Byron Angell running as anchor man on the sprint medley team was edged at the tape by a last second lunge by the Redmond anchor man.

Cottage Grove results were as follows: 100 yard dash — Greg Stewart won heat, time :10.9; Doug Ballew won heat, time :11.1; Dean Castle, 2nd in heat. High Hurdles — Joe McClarnan, won heat, time :17.0; Jim Hewes, 2nd in heat. High Jump — Larry Burlinson tied for third place at 5'9" in the Senior division.

Pole Vault — Byron Angell and Don Simons tied for first place in the novice division at 10'; Jay Wilson tied for fourth place in the senior division at 10'6". Discus — Henry Martin placed 4th and Jim Childers 5th in the novice division. Shot — Darrell Atchison placed 4th in the novice division. Shuttle Hurdle Relay — Team composed of Doug Ballew, Jim Hewes, Joe McClarnan and Jay Wilson won first with the good time of 1:05.8, which is a new school record. Sprint Medley Relay — Team composed of Grover Omyer, Greg Stewart, Tom Long and Byron Angell placed second.

### Salmon-Steelhead Punch Cards Due

Fishermen of the state—Attention! It is now the time to dig down in your wallet and fish out the salmon-steelhead punch card which you may or may not have used during the past year.

These greenish colored cards expire March 31 and are to be turned into the game commission license agencies. Boxes have been provided to the license agencies for collection of the cards.

New cards, containing room for recording 40 fish in the aggregate, not more than 20 of which may be salmon, will be issued by the license agents.

The purpose of the punch cards is to furnish information regarding the total catch of these fish and also to determine the number of fish taken from the various rivers of the state.

Dr. H. J. Rayner, chief of fisheries for the game commission, commenting on the cards stated, "By returning these report cards properly filled out, fishermen can actively assist the game commission with its fishery management program. We are hoping that all fishermen who went after salmon or steelhead will fill out and return the cards before May 15 so that compilation of statistics can begin as early as possible."

The new punch cards will be good until December 31 of this year when cards running according to the calendar year will be issued.

### McKenzie River Boat Landing Site Purchased

Forest Glen landing, at the head of the boat-fishing area on the McKenzie river in the town of Blue River, was recently purchased by the Oregon State Game Commission as a perpetual access site for fishermen. Long acclaimed one of the most important boat launching spots on the upper river, this landing site allows the fisherman to back his boat trailer right down to the water's edge. Forest Glen landing was obtained by the commission's federal aid department with Dingell-Johnson money which is apportioned to the states from the excise tax on fishing tackle.

Lane county will cooperate in further development and maintenance of the one acre site, and it is anticipated that trash cans will be placed at convenient locations. Fishermen are expected to show their good sportsmanship by helping to keep the area tidy. A small parking area is located just across the highway.

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### Fiftieth Year Of License Sale

The Oregon State Game Commission bulletin for the month of March shows the picture of one of the hunting licenses issued for the first year they were required in Oregon. That was 1905 and the license shown was issued to Fred Bennett of Coos county.

At the time of issue, the licenses were handled by the counties of the state who printed the licenses and forwarded fees collected to the state protective fund.

One of the readers of the bulletin recently presented an equally old license at the Portland office of the game commission.

Mr. Edgar Smith of Route 3, Box 130, Canby, Oregon, still has the license issued to him at the age of 18 by the county clerk of Clackamas county. The license was dated August 22, 1903, and like the Coos county license gave permission to hunt within the state until December 31.

The two licenses were numbered 10 and 69, the latter being issued on August 22 of 1905. Game commission records show that by the end of February 1955, 39,257 angling and 22,521 hunting licenses had been issued in Oregon.
