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Bishop Springer, Retired Missionary, To Speak at Methodist Church 26th



Bishop J. M. Springer, Bishop John M. Springer, of Chicago, Ill., and Mulumbwishi, Belgian Congo, Africa, retired missionary bishop of the Methodist Church for Central Africa, will be the guest-speaker at the Methodist Church Tuesday night, April 26. Bishop Springer was elected to the episcopacy in 1936 after a career of pioneering for Methodist missions on the African continent.

As a missionary, he arrived in Southern Rhodesia in the very early days of the establishment of that Mission and ten years later battled with the very primitive conditions in opening the work in

the Belgian Congo. He and Mrs. Springer, who died in 1943, trekked across the continent from the Indian Ocean to the Atlantic in 1907, and helped dramatize to American Methodists the needs of the African people.

A potluck dinner at 6:30 p.m. is being planned in honor of Bishop Springer. This will also be the annual birthday dinner when each member will have the opportunity of giving a penny for each year of their life. The proceeds will go for World Service.

Bishop Springer is an uncle of Miss Marjorie Arnold, local resident, and will be a guest at her apartment while here.

In 1913, he established a Mission Station at Kambove, overlooking a valley that was called Livingstone's Spruit, so named because to reach these copper mines was one of the objective points toward which Livingstone was striving at the time of his death in 1873. For some 28 years Bishop Springer was stationed not more than 300 miles from where Living-

stone died. In November, 1938, he was able at last to visit the grave of Livingstone's death and where his heart was buried.

Bishop Springer has had the privilege of seeing missionary work develop from its very inception to the place where annual conferences are constituted mainly by ministers of the native stock, which were gathered into the mission stations as very raw younglings direct from the heathen villages. In association with those of this rank and ability, are scores of other workers, native men and women who are giving sacrificial service on charges, in schools, in hospitals and in all the forms of general missionary work. His travels took him mostly by car now—where he went by foot, on donkeys and by bicycle in the early days—constantly back and forth from ocean to ocean across Central Africa, visiting annually all of the main mission stations of the church and many village stations and touching also incidentally the stations of a number of other mission societies.

On October 15, 1935, Bishop Springer was decorated with the Order of the Lion, by the King of the Belgians. He is a graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., Garrett Biblical Insti-

tute on the same campus, and has an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from the latter institution. He is a native of Wisconsin.

The 81-year-old missionary plans to return to Africa to spend the rest of his life.
