### OSC Science Events Draw Noted Speaker

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Three special science events at Oregon State college next week (April 24 to 30) will draw six of the nation's foremost scientists and exhibits made by more than 500 of the Northwest's top science students.

Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, atomic scientist, will speak April 26 and 28 as the annual Condon lecturer. His topic will be, "The Constitution of Matter."

The 16th annual biology colloquium April 29 will feature five visiting speakers. Dr. Ernst Mayr of Harvard university will be leader. Other speakers include Dr. Theodore Dobzhansky, Columbia university; Dr. Harlan Lewis, UCLA; and Dr. R. A. Sturton and Dr. Roger Y. Stanier, University of California.

The Northwest Science Exposition, May 2 to 6, will include more than 500 exhibits prepared by high school and elementary school pupils in Oregon and southwest Washington. Exhibits displayed at OSC will have been selected from thousands shown at preliminary district and county science shows. Exhibits will be judged April 30.

All of the lectures and displays are open to the public.
