George H. Johnson, Mapleton, and Dan P. Allen, Eugene, Lane County Co-chairmen for Oregon Conservation Week, May 1-7, today announced the appointment of committee members throughout the county to coordinate activities in connection with the week-long observance.

Miles O. Wicks of Cottage Grove was one of the 39 picked from Lane County.

In announcing names of their co-workers, Allen and Johnson said objectives of Conservation Week were to:

1. Encourage the wise use of all natural resources.

2. Promote increased conservation education in schools, clubs and civic groups.

3. Stress the importance of Oregon's agriculture, lumber, fishing, hunting, wildlife, water, soils and minerals.

"In its broadest sense, conservation can be summed up as meaning to use without using up, or to use wisely," Allen and Johnson stated, and conservation as a way of life must be encouraged by everyone if we are to continue to enjoy our high American standard of living.

"Conservation — a way of life" is the theme adopted by the Lane County committee.

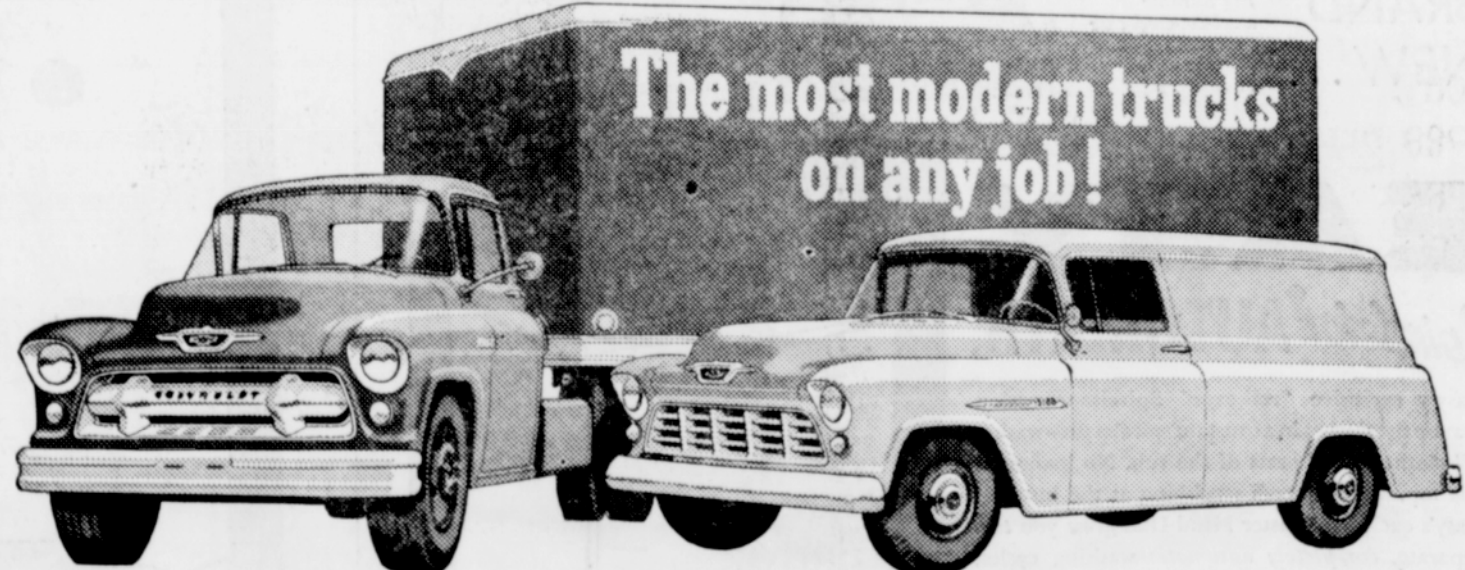

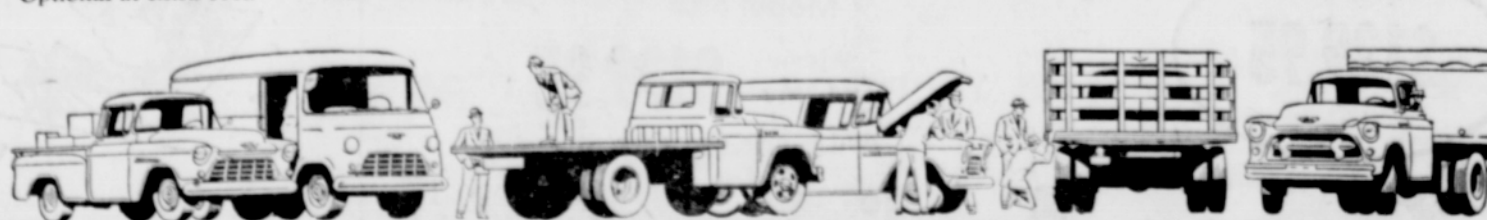
