Cub Track Squad Kicks off Season With Tie for 2nd

Jefferson Grade School's 8th grade track squad did surprisingly well when they nabbed a tie for second in a four-way meet with Thurston, Willamette and Springfield Saturday afternoon at Springfield. The score was Thurston - 43, Jefferson - 27, Willamette - 27, Springfield - 10.

Coach Ron Pupke said his boys did very well considering CG is the only one of these schools without a track and that Jeff's small outside field has been partly flooded.

Grove's outstanding performance was a 9' 6" pole vault effort by Vergil Hughes, who won the event easily.

Groves placing in the meet were: Woodson - 1st in 660; Suggs - 2nd in 660; McCoy - 4th in 660; Allen - tie for 2nd in pole vault and 4th in 330; Holmes - 3rd in 330; Claassen - 3rd in 70 and 160 yard dashes; Lionberger - 2nd in broad jump and Hemenway - 3rd in broad jump.

Pupke stated that had his three best high jumpers participated in the event, Cottage Grove would have won the meet. The high jump was won at only 4' 6", and all three of his boys could jump 4' 10". Two didn't hear the event when announced and the third went fishing.

Grove Frosh Win FourWay Track Meet Saturday

Cottage Grove's freshmen thin-clads clobbered the opposition in a four-way frosh track meet at Springfield Saturday afternoon, as the Lions totaled 78 2/3 points. Second place Thurston nabbed 35, while Springfield and Willamette trailed with 20 1/3 and 8.

The Lions picked up five blue ribbons, ten second places, six third places and eight yellow ribbons during the meet.

Top scorer for Cottage Grove was Dyrrol Burleson, who nabbed first in the 660 yard dash and 3/4 mile run and a tie for first in the high jump. Nortwing of Thurston picked up blues in the 70 yard dash and the Low Hurdles.

Fish Season Opens May 1 in Oregon

April 30 was "T" day for upwards of 300,000 persons in Oregon. The "T" stands for trout, for it is on this day that the 1955 trout season opened in Oregon according to word from the Oregon State Game Commission.

All zones of the state opened April 30, but the lakes, reservoirs, and their tributaries, within national forest boundaries, in the Cascade mountains, remain closed until May 28. There are a few areas which seem to have caused confusion in the minds of some of the eager Izaak Waltonians. Crane Prairie, southwest of Bend, is in the national forest and opens on the May date; however, nearby Wickup reservoir is an exception to the rule and opened on the 30th of April. Also opening on the 30th were Ochoco, Detroit, McKay, and Rock Creek reservoirs. Several other major lakes in national forests opened last weekend, including Blue, Creswell, Odell, and Little lakes (all in Deschutes national forest). Also Fish Lake in the Rogue national forest opened.

General trout bag limit for the state is 10 fish per day, not more than 5 of which may be 12 inches or over, and 20 fish in any seven consecutive days. Minimum length limit in zone 1 and parts of zones 3 and 4 is 8 inches. In other areas of the state, the minimum length limit is 6 inches. Anglers are urged to consult the angling synopsis for exceptions to the general rules.

Grove Jv Thinclads Top Indian Squad

Cottage Grove's Jayvee track team partially avenged the varsity squad's narrow defeat by the Roseburg harriers when they outpointed the host Roseburg JV's 65 2/3 to 56 1/3 Thursday afternoon. As in the varsity meet, the relay was the deciding race of the day, but the situation was reversed and CG nabbed the event and the meet. Grove had two double winners. Rolison took blue ribbons in both hurdles, while Watkins copped both the century dash and the 440 yard dash. Roseburg had a triple winner in Exeen, who took first in the Shot, Discus and Javelin. Friday of Roseburg copped the mile and 880 yard run.

Cottage Grove's track squad nearly upset a powerful Roseburg team Thursday afternoon as the host Indians copped the final and deciding event of the day, the relay, and edged CG 63-59. Roseburg was narrowly beaten out for first place in the recent Hayward ford tracksters, thus the Lions' near victory over Roseburg places them on a high track plateau.

Two school records were set during the meet when Henry Martin took a third place in the discus, but still set a new record in this event and big Dean Castle shattered the old school record of 46' plus with a 48' 6" effort.

Cottage Grove sprung an upset in the half mile when Dyrrol Burleson and Carl Davidson nipped Roseburg's Mark Robbins, state mile champ, at the tape.

Conservation Wk. Set for May 1-7

"America's leading sport is hunting and fishing," according to well-known sports caster Bill Stern. This is right in line with the thoughts of public and private agencies who have set aside the week of May 1-7 as Oregon Conservation Week. Governor Patterson has appointed key personnel around the state to head up this program.

The program is sponsored by the governor's committee on natural resources, and one of the members of this group is P. W. Schneider, state game director. The week is designed to focus attention on all of our natural resources of which wildlife is an important segment.
Pointing out the importance of continued wildlife crops through wise use and management, Bill Stern's information continued.
"Baseball drew 18 million paid customers in 1953, we had 20 million and horse racing pulled 30 million. Hunting and fishing outdrew them all with over 32 million hunters and fishermen buying licenses that year."
"Baseball equipment manufacturers sold 35 million dollars worth of goods, and golfers spent 80 million dollars on their sport. Hunters and fishermen made that look like small time deals by spending six billion dollars."

Breaks Drop Lion In Lane Star Meet

Bad breaks cost Cottage Grove the Lane County Star Meet Tuesday night on the Springfield oval as the Lions came in a close third behind Eugene and Springfield. Eugene had 92 points, Springfield 90 and CG 86.
Tommy Long's third place in the 440 was disqualified because judges stated he cut in too soon. This six points was only one of the ways in which Grove could have won the meet.

Nine schools participated in the meet, in which each school could enter only one man in each event. Jay Wilson's tie for first in the pole vault was Cottage Grove's only blue ribbon in the meet.
Dean Castle re-broke his school record of 48' 6" established last week with a 48' 7" toss, but still came in second. Another outstanding performance was freshman Dyrrol Burleson's 4:43 mile, which took second.

Coach John Young's Millers collected all their runs off Greg Stewart, a hurler who previously has been tough for Springfield hitters. In the remainder of the contest they were limited to two hits and went out in 1-2-3 fashion. Larry Mason was the relieving pitcher for Stewart.

Springfield collected the seven runs off two walks, two fielder's choices, a hit by pitched ball and only one hit.

Grove tallied single runs in the third, fourth and fifth innings. Don Heck singled, stole second and scored on a passed ball for the first one; Ron Rice reached first on a fielder's choice and scored on Stewart's single; and Leon Hayes singled, stole second and scored on Heck's single.

Doughty and Moore led the Springfield hitters with a double and single apiece. Ellsworth clouted a double and single to lead Grove's batters. He was followed by Heck with two singles and Rice with a double.

Lance Naish of the local post office took third place with a double frame of United States commemorative stamps all of the 1952 Mount Rushmore issue displayed in blocks, strips, singles, and on covers. Fourth place went to Nathan Sessions, who exhibited a frame of railroad topics arranged to illustrate the outline of a mid-nineteenth century western locomotive. The final recognition award, fifth place, was awarded to Horace Hatch for a display of two frames, one containing various commemorative issues of European nations, and the other, the complete 1937 presidential regular postage series of the U. S.

Other Entries
Other entries in the show were a design of the U. S. flag made up of framed U. S. commemorative issues by Virginia Bullock, and a frame of triangle issues of European nations by Frank and Joan Pattee. Bill Randall, winner of the "Gold Cup" award in 1954, brought his winning frame of souvenir sheets of U. S. Postage for non-competitive exhibition.

Judging the entries in the exhibition were members of the Greater Eugene Stamp Society, Cyrus Prouty, Chuck Hottenstein, Warren Johnson, R. E. Manson, Ed Zimmerman and Vernon Meyer, president of the club.

Chief judge for the show was Leo Burton of Eugene, also chief judge of the 15th Pacific Inter-

national Philatelic Exhibition, sponsored by the Northwest Federation of Stamp clubs, of which the local group is a member. The exhibition will be held in Eugene May 28-30. Several of the frames displayed at the local show will be entered in the NW Federation show.

Winning entries of the local show were announced by president Joyce Bomar, following the judging. Hoyer received the cup from Burton, who then constructively criticized the entries in the show for the benefit of the participants and guests.

The evening program closed with the serving of refreshments by Mae Wilson, Joyce Bomar, June Hoyer, Joan Pattee and Karen Hoyer.

Fall hunting populations of game birds are dependent on good spring crops of young ones. Disturbed nests don't make for good crops of young birds.

The game commission urges all pet owners to keep their animals from roaming the fields for the next few months and give the birds a chance to raise their families.

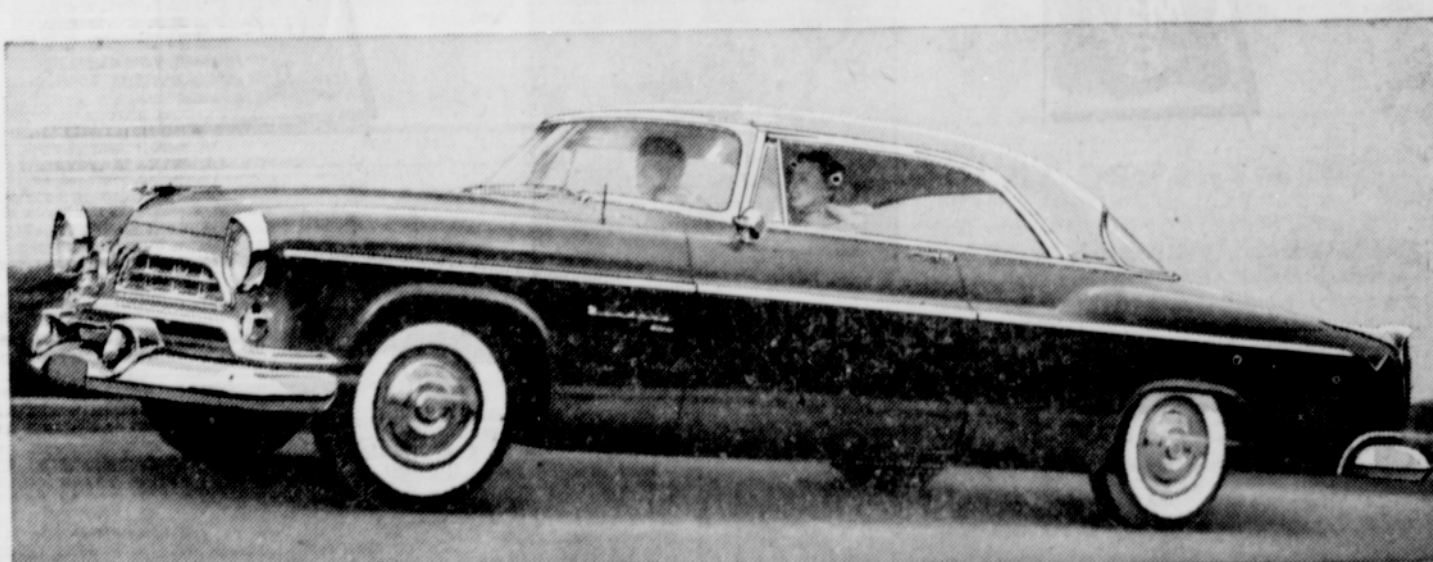
