### Dr. Roecker Speaks to Beta Zetas, Explains Children's Hospital School

The regular business meeting of Beta Zeta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha was held April 27 at the home of Mrs. Bob Stapleton. Mrs. Lloyd Peterson introduced the guest speaker for the evening, who was William A. Roecker, Ph.D., managing Director of the Children's Hospital School in Eugene. Dr. Roecker showed movies made in the school in Eugene plus a section of the first year's outing for the children from the school at Camp Easter Seal.

Following the completion of the movie, Dr. Roecker conducted a discussion period. The entire school program was explained by Dr. Roecker during this period, plus information concerning the admission qualifications, fees, training, medical service, clinic privileges, means of support. The two qualifications for admission to the school for a child are to be orthopedically handicapped, and educational. Dr. Roecker further explained the staff duties, while it is called a crippled children's school, it is not a hospital in the sense we normally think. It is actually a school for these crippled children with therapy and medical treatment given in conjunction with their class work. The entire foundation is a "Easter Seal Service."

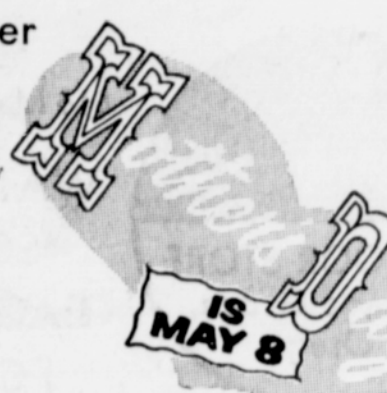
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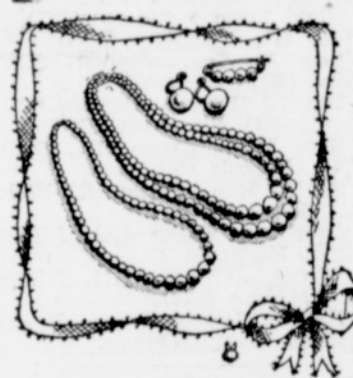

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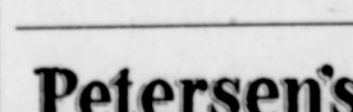
