The National Chiropractic Association and the Oregon Association of Chiropractic Physicians are sponsoring National Correct Posture Week from May 1 to 7, endeavoring to educate the public to the value of proper posture and to develop a national consciousness on this important health problem. Five UO Faculty To Study Under Ford Fund Grants

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—Five members of the University of Oregon faculty will spend the next year in study under grants from the Ford Foundation. Four of the faculty men will study under the Fund for the Advancement of Education, under the five-year old project that has as its objective the improvement of teaching at the college level.

The four are Dr. Howard E. Dean, assistant professor of political theory at Harvard University; Dr. Perry J. Powers, assistant professor of Romance languages, will also study at Harvard; Dr. Ivan M. Niv, professor of mathematics, will do research at the University of California, Berkeley; and Dr. William A. Williams, assistant professor of history, will participate in historical sessions at various universities and read major works in the social sciences.

Dr. Donald S. Willis, assistant professor of Oriental languages, will spend the year in Japan at Kyoto University under a Foreign Research fellowship.

CITES ROAD NEEDS



WASHINGTON—National unity, the nation's economy, and ultimately its defense hinge on the development of a national road program. Testifying before a Senate Subcommittee on Roads here James J. Nance, president of the Automobile Manufacturers Association, said that these modern highways would be supplemented by new fast-market and feeder roads which were an economic necessity and a capital investment in our own future. Nance, who is also president of Studebaker-Packard Corporation, urged consideration for the two major aspects of the President's program: (1) Full modernization of the vital 40,000-mile interstate highway system and (2) completion of the entire plan within 10 years.
