Missionaries Leave For Work in Nassau

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hughes, missionaries of the Church of Christ, and their two children, Paul and Lois Marie, left Monday on their return trip to Nassau, Bahamas, after a visit of some time here. Mr. Hughes is the "Living Link" of the Gibbs Avenue Church of Christ which is supporting him. While here they were guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Finnerty.

The work of the Churches of Christ began in Nassau, capital city of the Bahamas, in February, 1952, as the result of the labors of Hubert Prather, minister of the Drain Church of Christ, and the Robert Beaches of Cottage Grove.

The Hughes family arrived in Nassau on May 31, 1952, a few weeks after Mr. Prather returned to the States. They continued their work there for two years and returned to the States about a year ago.

At present there are two established meeting places where regular services are conducted. Two other missionary families are now on the field, the Burl Shoemaker and Aubrey Paynes.

Plans for a training program are underway to train the natives to work among their own people.

Annual Ingathering Supports Missions

The annual Ingathering appeal to help support and extend the worldwide mission work was launched recently by the Cottage Grove Seventh-day Adventist Church by the pastor, J. C. Hanson.

The goal for the church this year is to add more missions to their world wide program with the promise of the British Government of 100 new missionaries to New Guinea, a country which still practices cannibalism. The Seventh-day Adventist Church has mission work in every country in the world except 32. "The sun never sets on our mission work," the pastor said.

Last year the local church raised \$1,200 and that is the goal the church plans to reach in three weeks through members and business firm contributions and door-to-door solicitation.

On a national scale last year more than 3,500,000 articles of clothing and bedding and 1,609,373 baskets of food were given to those in need through welfare work directed by the church. Deductions for administrative expense was nil since projects supported by Ingathering funds are administered by existing church organizations with incomes derived elsewhere.

\$36,000,000 Given to Missions

Besides public subscription, Adventist members themselves last year gave more than \$36,000,000 for support of a program of missions, medical and educational work in 197 countries.

"Christian welfare work done here in Cottage Grove for the last six months was as follows: \$137 in cash, 116 food baskets given away; 1,434 articles of clothing given away overseas and locally; 10 quilts were made by the local ladies, half of them went to war orphanages in Korea, the rest were used locally. This work helped approximately 134 people in the community with six families receiving special help with clothes, food and even rent."

"Christian missions at home and abroad have always been one of the most powerful forces for enlightening backward peoples" the pastor said in announcing this year's drive. "Millions of persons are being helped to help themselves," he added. "This is the effective way to build solidly for a more progressive free world."
