

Lion Cindermen Cop No. 2 Spot In Sub-Dist. 4 Track Meet Sat.

Cottage Grove High's cinder squad came in second behind Eugene High's harriers at the sub-district 4 track and field meet held on Silke Field in Springfield Saturday. The Lions totaled 104 1/5 points to Eugene's 124 1/5, while Springfield trailed third with 81 2/5. Eight schools competed in the meet.

Outstanding performers for the locals were Doug Ballew and Jay Wilson. Ballew competed in four events, 100 yard dash, low hurdles, pole vault and relay, and won a berth for the coming district meet in all four. Wilson broke his last year's vault record of 12' 1 3/4" with a 12' 7 3/4" effort.

Lion Nine Splits Twin Bill With Roseburg for 1st Season Win

Cottage Grove High's baseball team outclubbed the league leading Roseburg Indians to split a twin bill 8-3 and 2-3 at Roseburg Tuesday afternoon. It was the team's first league win of the season after a four loss record.

Roseburg - 8, Cottage Grove - 3. Twelve errors were the main factor in CG's loss to the Indians. Three errors in the first frame aided Roseburg in jumping off to a 4-2 lead. They got but one hit here, a three bagger, and no more until the fifth inning. Grove's two tallies came when Hayes and Rice, who both belted singles, came home on the double of Ellsworth, who was left stranded on third.

Both teams were held hitless in the 2nd and 3rd innings, but Roseburg, boosted by four Grove errors, managed to eke out a score. Lions were left stranded on all bases during the 2nd frame.

Cottage Grove tallied once in the 4th inning when Gamble walked to first and made it home on Castle's single.

The 6th inning broke CG's back when the Indians pounded out two singles and a circuit clout for three tallies.

Cottage Grove out hit the Indians 6-5, but they also out errored them 12-4.

Cottage Grove's first win of the season can be mainly attributed to Leon Hayes, who struck out nine of the first 11 batters he faced, racked up a total of 12 strikeouts while going the distance and allowed only three hits in the entire five innings.

Two hits and a couple of errors

netted Roseburg one run and a 1-0 lead until the 3rd frame. Here Cottage Grove piled up three hits and a sacrifice for a 2-1 margin which they never lost. Hayes and Byron Angell belted singles and reached home plate on Ballew's two bagger.

In the 4th frame, the Lions tallied again, with the winning run, when Ellsworth clobbered a long triple and scampered home when Greg Stewart blasted a sacrifice fly to left field.

Roseburg scored again in the 5th when Hargis reached first on an error and made it home on Oerding's double. It was here that Hayes severed up the contest. With one man out and the bases loaded, he pulled it out of the fire with two consecutive strikeouts.

Freed Steelhead Total 127,000 Fish

Steelhead liberations from Oregon fish commission hatcheries so far this year total approximately 127,000 fish, Irvine French, commission director of fish culture, announced this week.

During March, French stated, 47,000 steelhead averaging seven inches in length were released into Big Creek, a Columbia river tributary near Astoria. The fish were reared at the Big Creek salmon hatchery. Another 80,000 of the young sea-going rainbows went into the Sandy river system from the Sandy river hatchery during March and April. This group of fish averaged six inches in length.

There are still 1,374,000 steelhead fingerlings on hand at six fish commission hatcheries throughout the state. French said most of these fingerlings are being held until they attain a larger size, but would probably be liberated within the next two months.

Study of Dover Sole Announced By Commission

George Y. Harry, Jr., Oregon fish commission director of research, announced this week that a study of migrational habits of dover sole found in ocean depths off the mouth of the Columbia river during winter and early spring months has been initiated by the fish commission.

To date, 978 dover sole have been tagged with small, plastic discs by Biologists Sigurd J. Westheim and Walter G. Jones. The tagging is being done at sea aboard the Marian F., an Astoria dragboat skippered by Martin Hansen.

Main objective of the dover sole study, explained Harry, is to determine if this species inhabits deep water areas during winter months only and migrates to relatively shallower waters of the continental shelf for the remainder of the year.

Dover sole have been caught in the shallower waters for several years, but deep water trawling has been developed only in recent years. Harry said that if the deep water and shallow water fish are identical, the new fishery could mean added pressure to stocks of fish which already show signs of depletion.

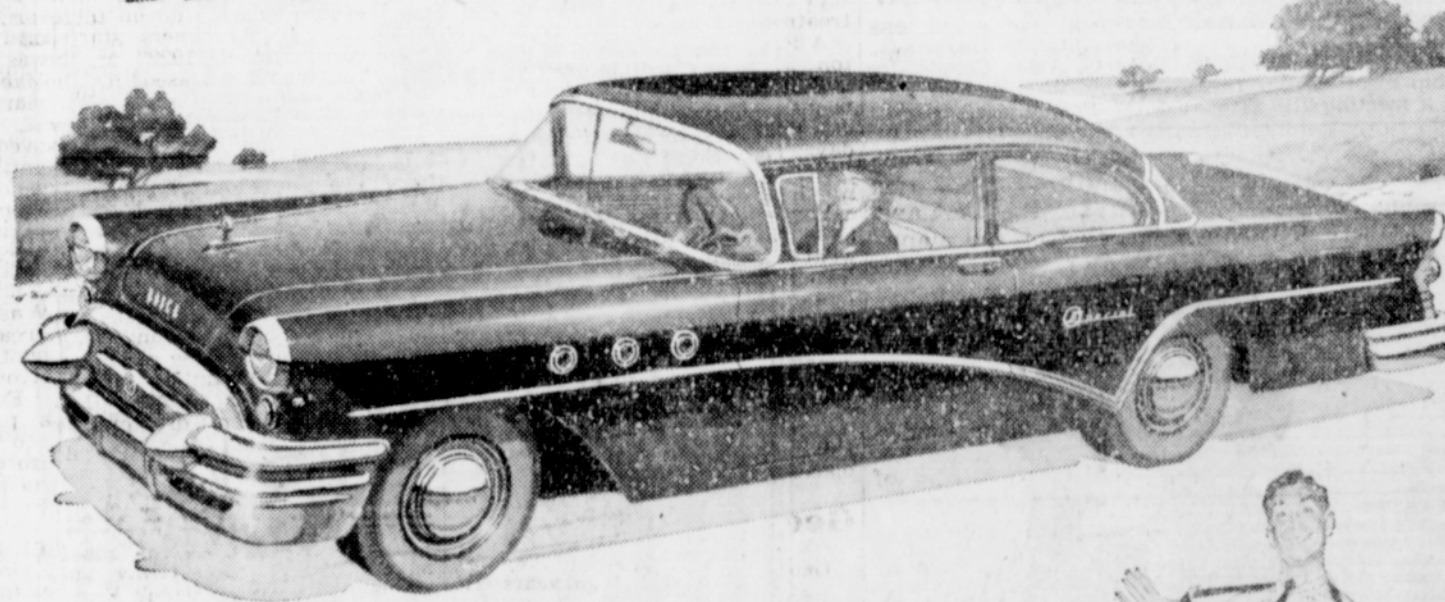
