Grove Guard Unit Starts Campaign For More Members

1st Lt. Thomas E. Engle, commanding Co. B 186th Inf. Oregon National Guard, announced today that the unit is launching a month's recruiting campaign to bring it up to its full, authorized strength.

"We feel that our unit's participation in the recent National Guard nationwide test alert has made our fellow citizens in this area more aware of the services the Guard renders in peace as well as in war," he declared.

Many Eligible

"There are many young men and veterans here who are eligible for Guard membership. We extend a cordial invitation to them to join Co. B and to serve with their friends and neighbors from their own home areas."

1st Lt. Thomas E. Engle pointed out there are many advantages in National Guard membership.

"There is, first of all," he said, "the great personal satisfaction and prestige of serving one's community, state and country in the nation's oldest military organization. All Guardsmen are volunteers and all are inspired to serve, primarily, by the highest patriotic motives," he added.

Other major advantages of Guard membership, Lt. Engle continued, are that Guardsmen receive the pay of Regular Army personnel or equivalent grade, and have many opportunities for promotion to non-commissioned officer and commissioned officer rank, retirement pay, service at home with friends and neighbors, and the opportunity to continue in normal occupations while belonging to the Guard.

1st Lt. Thomas E. Engle said eligible men can enlist in Co. B at the armory any day Monday thru Friday, between the hours of 8 to 5.

Information on the National Guard can be secured in person, by mail or telephone at the same place, he declared. The phone number there is 320.

LC College Schedules Summer Workshop

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE, Portland (Special)—The college will conduct three special workshops during the summer session—in choral direction, in television production and in inter-cultural relations.

Dr. Leonard dePaur, conductor of the widely acclaimed dePaur Infantry chorus since 1947, will conduct an intensive one-week program June 20 through 25 designed especially for high school choral directors and church choir leaders. It will include classes and demonstrations of choral organization, new music reading and conducting. Dr. dePaur will be assisted by L. Stanley Giarum, director of the college choir.

A production workshop in planning and telecasting educational television programs will be offered at the college June 13 through July 22. John E. Miller will be co-ordinator of the workshop. He has had experience in commercial television both as a technician and as an independent producer. The workshop will emphasize the creation of local live shows designed to inform as well as to entertain and will cover station operation, facilities and duties of personnel. Staff members from local stations will participate.

A three-week workshop in inter-cultural relations will be jointly conducted by the college and the National Association of Christians and Jews June 13 to July 1. Dr. Edward G. Olsen, nationally known educator, and Dr. H. S. Tuttle, professor of education, will serve as directors.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Beaver Boys State, with approximately 500 high school boys participating, will be held at Oregon State college June 12 to 18.

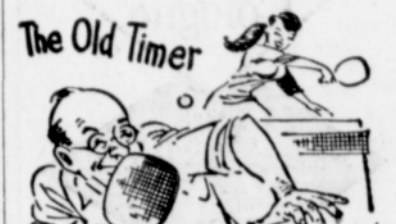
Sponsored by the American Legion, the week citizenship camp will draw boys from communities across the state. Youths attending are sponsored by local service and community groups.

Carnegie Program Names Ore. Prof

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May (Special)—Dr. E. G. Ebbighausen, associate professor of physics here, has been named as one of 12 professors in the United States to participate in the Carnegie Foundation's internship program next year.

The program allows those interested in teaching to attend Harvard, Yale, Columbia or Chicago universities, where they spend one-third of the time teaching and two-thirds of the time in pursuit of their own fields of interest.



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Dr. Ebbighausen will attend Harvard next year, where he will participate in a general education program in the physical sciences at the institution. In his teaching work, he will be closely connected with a new course which is a synthesis of geology and astronomy. He will have the title of Visiting Fellow in General Education. The internship program is now

in the fifth year of operation. During that time only four West Coast professors have been selected for the program.

Dr. Ebbighausen came to the university in 1946, from the Westinghouse Research Laboratories. He received his doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1940, and

taught at the University of Pittsburgh from 1941 to 1944. At Oregon he directs activities connected with the new telescope, which is mounted on top of the science building.

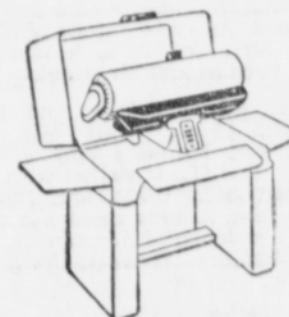
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
