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Hoyer, Naish Will Represent Society At Regional Meet

Ivan C. Hoyer, secretary-treasurer of South Lane Stamp Society, was selected by the membership to represent the Society as a delegate to the 15th annual Northwest Federation of Stamp clubs exhibition and convention, which will be in Eugene May 28 to 30.

Lance Naish was chosen to be the representative of the Society as a judge to the exhibition. He will assist Chief Judge Leo R. T. Burton, of Creswell, in judging the more than 300 frames of stamps to be on display at the show.

The Northwest Federation of Stamp clubs is a regional organization of stamp societies, more than 25 in number, located principally in the states of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia and Vancouver Island. The Federation is one of several regional federations covering the United States and Canada.

Each year the Northwest Federation of Stamp clubs hold its annual Pacific International Exhibition in a different convention and exhibition city located in the Pacific Northwest. The exhibition

itself will be held in Eugene Hotel and will be open to the public throughout the Memorial Day weekend.

Officials for the show state they have received more than 300 applications from collectors who will display frames at the exhibition. Visitors to the show are assured of seeing stamps that they may have never seen, or will ever see again, so diversified are the entries of rare and unusual philatelic materials.

The Greater Eugene Stamp Society, host club for the show, urges all stamp collectors and the interested public to be in Eugene and view the exhibition during the three days, May 28, 29 and 30, that the show will be in progress.

OSC Student Loans Reach Million Mark

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A million dollar business has been done by the Oregon State college student loan fund since it was organized 30 years ago, according to a 1955 report that shows \$52,000 was loaned to students this year.

Long-term loans—up to one year—have totaled \$912,118 since the fund was set up in 1925, according to William M. Langan, agricultural student personnel adviser and chairman of the loan committee. Emergency 30-day loans have averaged about \$30,000 during the past four years.

Made possible by gifts and grants to the institution, the loan fund is maintained to "aid those who are determined to secure an education and who are paying the cost wholly or in part from their own earnings."

Students are eligible for loan aid after they have attended OSC one term. All but a "small handful" of the thousands of loans made over the years have been repaid, Langan said.
