

Boy Scout Troop 28 of Creswell Wins High Camping Award at Bohemia District Camporee Held on May 22-22

A highly successful Boy Scout Camporee was set up and conducted by Fred Kelly, District Camping chairman for the Bohemia District Council, at Pole camp, three miles east of Disston over the weekend of May 22-22.

Kelly was assisted by field Scout executive, Larry Jack, from the Eugene office of the Oregon Trail Council, and by a host of Scoutmasters and troop executives who came to the camporee with their respective Boy Scout units.

Over 120 boys turned out for the two and a half day camping session, and participated in a planned schedule of activities set up by the District Council. The boys brought their own camping gear and cooked their own meals during the camporee and were judged by units on their skill in camping and field cooking. Awards were given for such activities as tent peg making, blindfolded compass course, height judging, first aid relay and knot tying.

Awards Given Sunday
The major awards, given by the Bohemia District Council for the best units represented at the camporee, were presented at the close of activities Sunday morning. Troop #28 of Creswell, under the supervision of Loren Westrop, was chosen to receive the "blue" award for the best unit at the camporee.

The second, or "red" awards, three in number, went to Troop 13 from Dorena, with Don Davis in charge; Troop 78 of Drain with John Thompson, and Troop 132 of Jack Spady's LDS unit from Cottage Grove. The third, "yellow" award was presented to Dr. David Morris and his Troop 18 from Cottage Grove.

Other units at the camporee were Troop 78 from Drain, under the leadership of Jim Bush, who is also Bohemia District Commissioner.

Wayne Vaughn, Joe Knouse, Clair Hogate, Carmen Huffman and R. Hoge also contributed to the success of the camporee in a supervisory capacity.

Much of the credit for the planning and the successful manner in which the Camporee was conducted goes to Fred Kelly, said Bohemia District chairman, Taylor Young. "He chose the campsite, saw to the various safety and health precautionary measures that were necessary before the Camporee could take place, and was on the job throughout the entire period of activities, keeping the program moving and helping the boys with their project."

Young also stated that many of the skills practiced by the boys attending the camporee will be demonstrated at the Boy Scout-Camporee to be held in Cottage Grove during the Centennial program in July.

OSC to Confer 1040 Degrees At Graduation

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Approximately 1040 degrees will be conferred by Oregon State College at its 86th annual commencement exercises, Monday, June 6.

The total includes 52 doctor's degrees, 214 master's and about 744 bachelor's degrees. The 214 master's degrees is a new record number for the institution.

Baccalaureate will be held Sunday, June 5, at 11 a.m. Speaker will be Dr. Raymond B. Walker, minister for the past 26 years of First Congregational Church, Portland.

The commencement program will be June 6 at 10 a.m. Following OSC custom, there will be no commencement speaker, but President A. L. Strand will deliver his annual class message after conferring the degrees.

Graduates who have completed advanced reserve officer training in the air force, army, navy and marine corps units will be commissioned as part of the commencement exercises.

Both programs will be held in the coliseum to provide maximum seating for relatives and visitors. Traditional class reunions will be held June 4. Classes planning special reunions this year are 1905, 1915 and 1930. Individual class luncheons are planned at noon with the alumni banquet scheduled at 6:30 p.m.

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Ore. Egg Producers Names New Head

J. Clifford Hess, Roseburg poultryman, was named to a second one-year term as president of the Oregon Egg Producers at their annual meeting in Portland on May 17. Other officers elected to second terms were Fred Petersen, Junction City, first vice president and Ewald Ek, West Linn, secretary-treasurer. Kelly Linn, St. John, was named to replace W. W. Abraham, Shedd, as second vice president.

Announcement of election results for the Board of Directors was also made at the 35th Annual Meeting of the farmer-owned marketing and purchasing cooperative. Elected to two year terms were Hess, Petersen, Dunbar Carpenter, Medford; Harlan Christensen, McMinnville; Howard Hughes, Hillsboro and D. L. St. John, Gervais. Merrill L. Jensen, Eugene, was elected to his first full term as director.

Incumbent directors are H. W. Akerstedt, Astoria; Fred Cockell, Milwaukie; LeRoy I. Snyder, Astoria; Abraham, Comstock and Ek.

Growth of Plants
Organized in 1920, the Oregon

Egg Producers now has 16 plants and branch stations in western Oregon serving more than 4200 farmers. Assets of the Association now total almost 3 1/2 million dollars with not one cent of funds indebtedness.

General Manager H. R. Rohe reported that dollar volume of business in 1954 totaled 9 1/2 million dollars, while patronage savings of \$655,000 were returned to members. This brings the total refunds to members in cash or its equivalent to almost \$3,000,000 in the past five years. The entire state has, in turn, benefited from this increased purchasing power in the hands of local producers.

Tax Payer
Rohe emphasized the fact that the Oregon Egg Producers is a full fledged tax paying member of the business community. In 1954, as in every year past, the Oregon Egg Producers paid taxes on the same basis as all other business enterprises. In addition, members paid income taxes on all patronage refunds received.

The membership unanimously adopted a resolution opposing the suggested new minimum egg weights, which the U.S.D.A. proposes to put into effect on January 1, 1956, as being detrimental to producers and of no benefit to consumers.

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
