Children Without Milk

The recent strike of milk drivers in Portland is said to have shut off the home delivery milk supply to a trickle and the average citizen must have been pretty well disgusted with the situation as we get the picture because milk is regarded as an essential diet of children, but since no deliveries were made, fresh milk was not available.

According to the information made public there was but one issue and that was that the management sought to insert in a new contract between the Portland milk distributors and the AFL Dairy, Ice and Ice Cream Drivers local of Portland and the clause in the contract sought to give the distributors the right to adjust their routes and in some cases make a three day delivery instead of a daily delivery.

The union objected to the route adjustment clause. Drivers feared the dairies intended to reduce expenses by whitening the routes down. Members of the association did not deny the deliveries may become less frequent, but they have given assurance that no driver will lose his job.

It appears both management and the union is making an issue at the expense of the children. Three times a week deliveries may be inevitable if the price of delivered milk is to remain competitive. Other dairies there have switched to the three day per week delivery schedule without difficulty. Milk customers could be driven to go to the markets and stores, if the milk situation continues to be disrupted on such a minor issue. In this case the milk truck drivers might disappear with the old time delivery wagon of the grocery store.

At best it's pretty bad that a minor difference between the two factors be allowed to disrupt the milk supply of over a half million people.

Grads Never Had It So Good

It appears to us that college and high school graduates never had it so good in the matter of stepping into good jobs. As previously mentioned, the College and University is graduating the lowest crop of depression babies, boys and girls who were born from 1930 to 1934.

The need is so critical for the average college graduate that he is often signed up before leaving college. This is especially true of engineering and physics students with the demand for the journalist student not far behind.

It might be several generations before we could witness the present demand for trained help. If this is so and many indications point to the fact that we are "Sorter living in the milk and honey age," we certainly should enjoy it.

Big Repair Task Ahead

More than \$100 billion must be spent in the next 10 years to repair the nation's non-farm homes, a meeting of mutual savings banks officials was told recently. That sum will be needed for such work as painting, replacing heating equipment, re-wiring old homes and modernizing bathrooms. Such outlays will keep hundreds of thousands of carpenters, painters, tile setters and handymen busy throughout the nation, and will account for a large volume of such products as lumber, ceramic tile, cement and even steel.

Butter has made a come back from a few years ago when fats were pretty well restricted. During the war, margarine got the jump on its competitor. Disappearance of the federal tax on margarine further narrowed the gap.

Now butter is coming back, aided by a price drop of about twenty cents over a year ago. Butter is now being used at the rate of 10.4 pounds compared to nine pounds last year.

Heads of two major political parties met on radio Sunday to talk about the merits of their respective parties. Except for the fact that the democrats could not account for the present prosperity, the meeting ended in a draw.

Two things may move to slow down the present full employment according to the economists. One is excessive credit and the pattern of wages moving up.

June, Month of Flowers, to Bless Oregon With Colorful Events From Rose Festival Parade to Hot Cake Feed

SALEM—(Special)—June, the month of flowers, will be busy with colorful events, listed by the Travel Information Division, Oregon State Highway Department.

Portland's 47th Annual Rose Festival is expected to draw thousands from up-state and around the nation for its five-day run, June 8-12. The Grand Floral Parade, climax of the celebration, will move from S. W. 14th and Salmon Street at 10 a.m., June 11, Saturday, after an earlier showing at Multnomah Stadium and departure from the stadium at 9:30 a.m. Route is the same as last year: 14th, Washington, 10th, Madison, Broadway, Oak, Fifth, Yamhill, Third, West Burnside, Burnside, Bridge, East Burnside, Grand, Morrison, Seventh, Sandy, 11th, Davis, 12th, north on N.E. 12th to Benson High School and disband.

Junior Rose Parade
 The Junior Rose Parade will begin at 2 p.m., Friday, June 10, in the Northeast District of Portland. Queen selection and Coronation will be held 8 p.m., June 8, Multnomah Stadium; the 67th Annual Rose Show, at the Public Auditorium, June 10 and 11; and night shows at Multnomah Stadium, 8 p.m., June 9-10, "Dancing Waters" and "Starlight Serenades," including Dennis Day with the Sportsmen Quartet, Meredith Willson and orchestra and Gloria Kreiger.

Two pioneer celebrations during June include Lincoln County Pioneer Days, June 24-26, Toledo and Phil Sheridan Days, June 17-19, Sheridan. Phil Sheridan Days features a Children's Parade, 11 a.m., June 17, and a park program and District Soap Box Derby in the afternoon with street dance at 8:30 p.m.

Hot Cake Breakfast

On Saturday, June 18, the day begins with Hot Cake Breakfast, 6 a.m.; Historical Parade, 10 a.m. Rodeo, 1 p.m., and Phil Sheridan Days, 2 p.m. Final Rodeo is at 1 p.m. Sunday.

Riding of Miss Lincoln County begins the Toledo celebration on the evening of June 24; on June 25, events include clown acts and special events on the main street; parade, 1 p.m., terminating at Memorial Field where a three hour show follows; free cornbread and bean feed, 6 p.m.; whiskey and costume judging followed by street dance and public dance at Legion Hall, 7 p.m. The celebration ends on Sunday, June 26 with a parade on Yaquina Bay and baseball at Memorial Field.

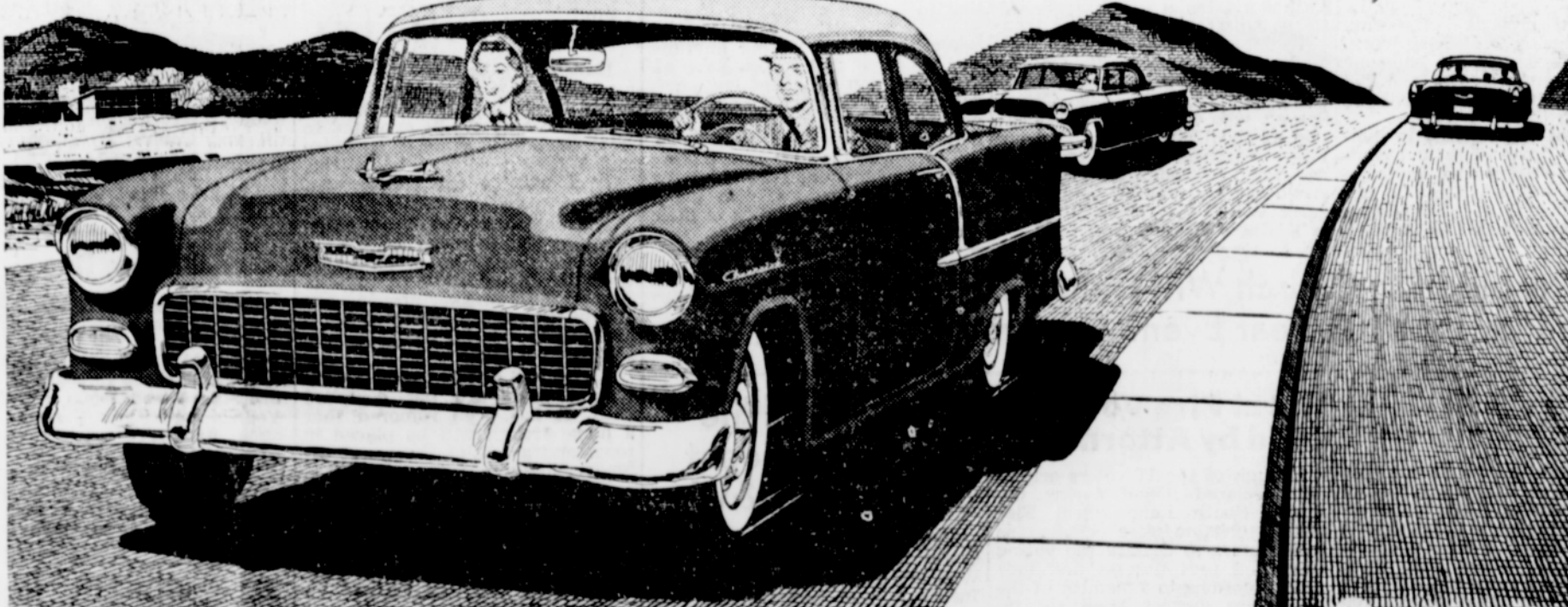
