Teamster's Strike Leaves 5000 Men Unemployed; Payroll Loss; Says Long

At least 5000 people in the trucking industry are out of work in Oregon because of the Teamster's strike, with a resultant payroll loss of \$450,000 to \$500,000 a week, states Wilford C. Long, secretary of the Truck Operators League of Oregon.

Speaking for the 44 common carrier members of the Truck Operators League, Long said that 95% of the common carrier freight in the state, Long says:

"The trucking industry had hoped that this strike would be settled quickly, and has, therefore been silent regarding the issues involved."

"Public Jeopardized"

"Now, however, that the welfare of the public is being jeopardized, those who constitute the Oregon trucking industry believe that in all fairness to the public and to the rank and file union members, the issues involved should be explained."

"Wages are not a prime issue in this dispute. Actually, we are not too far apart on the question of wages. But there are some demands which we believe would endanger not only our own business, but have a serious effect on all business and industry in Oregon and the other ten western states."

"Among them is a 'hot cargo' clause. This means that a business agent of a teamster union would have the right to place any merchandise or product or service on a taboo list if there were disagreements. This essentially means that the teamster business agent would become judge and jury and executioner of any business which might not meet union demands."

"Menacing Proposals"

"Another menacing proposal which the union seeks is the right to cancel its own contract with any trucker at any time for any real or fancied cause by ordering a 'quickie strike' against the employer."

"Still other proposals call for check-off contributions to a non-
